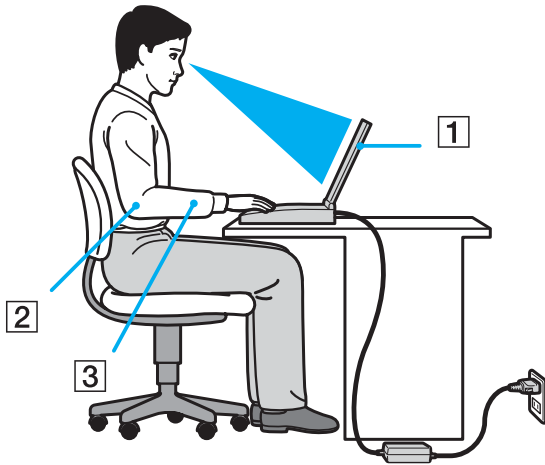

Ergonomic Considerations

You will be using your computer as a portable device in a variety of environments. Whenever possible, you should attempt to take account of the following ergonomic considerations to both stationary and portable environments:



- ❑ **Position of your computer** – Place the computer directly in front of you (1). Keep your forearms horizontal (2), with your wrists in a neutral, comfortable position (3) while using the keyboard, touch pad, or external mouse. Let your upper arms hang naturally at your sides. Have breaks during sessions with your computer. Excessive use of the computer may strain muscles or tendons.
- ❑ **Furniture and posture** – Sit in a chair with good back support. Adjust the level of the chair so your feet are flat on the floor. A footrest may make you more comfortable. Sit in a relaxed, upright posture and avoid slouching forward or leaning far backwards.










- ❑ **Viewing angle of the computer's display** – Use the display's tilting feature to find the best position. You can reduce eye strain and muscle fatigue by adjusting the tilt of the display to the proper position. Adjust the brightness setting of the display as well.
- ❑ **Lighting** – Choose a location where windows and lights do not create glare and reflection on the display. Use indirect lighting to avoid bright spots on the display. You can also purchase accessories for your display that help reduce glare. Proper lighting adds to your comfort and work effectiveness.
- ❑ **Positioning an external display** – When using an external display, set the display at a comfortable viewing distance. Make sure the display screen is at eye level or slightly lower when you are sitting in front of the monitor.

About the Indicator Lights

Indicator	Functions
Power 	Illuminates when the power of the computer is on, blinks in Standby mode, and turns off when the computer is in Hibernate mode or off.
Battery 	Illuminates when the computer is using battery power, blinks when the battery is running out of power, and double-blinks when the battery is charging.
Memory Stick Pro/Duo 	Illuminates when data is read from or written to the Memory Stick media. (Do not enter Standby mode or turn off the computer when this indicator is on.) When the indicator is off, the Memory Stick media is not being used.
Optical disc drive 	Illuminates when data is read from or written to the optical disc. When the indicator is off, the optical disc is not being used.
Hard disk 	Illuminates when data is read from or written to the hard disk. Do not enter Standby mode or turn off the computer when this indicator is on.
Num Lock 	Press the Num LK key to activate the numeric keypad. Press it a second time to deactivate the numeric keypad. The numeric keypad is not active when the indicator is off.
Caps Lock 	Press the Caps Lock key to type letters in uppercase. Letters appear in lowercase if you press the Shift key while the indicator is on. Press the key a second time to turn off the indicator. Normal typing resumes when the Caps Lock indicator is off.
Scroll Lock 	Press the Scroll Lock key to change how you scroll the display. Normal scrolling resumes when the Scroll Lock indicator is off. The Scroll Lock key functions differently depending on the program you are using and does not work with all programs.
Bluetooth  *	Illuminates when the WIRELESS switch is set to ON and Bluetooth technology is enabled.
WIRELESS LAN	Illuminates when the wireless LAN function is running.

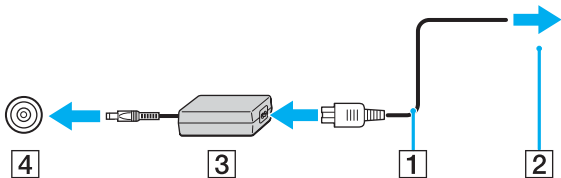
Connecting a Power Source

You can use either an AC adapter or a rechargeable battery pack as a power source.

Using the AC Adapter

To use the AC adapter

- 1 Plug one end of the power cord (1) into the AC adapter.
- 2 Plug the other end of the power cord into an AC outlet (2).
- 3 Plug the cable attached to the AC adapter (3) into the DC In port (4) on the computer.



! The shape of the DC In plug varies depending on the AC adapter.



Use your computer only with the supplied AC adapter.

To disconnect your computer completely from AC power, unplug the AC adapter.

Make sure that the AC outlet is easily accessible.

If you do not use the AC adapter for a long period of time, put your computer into **Hibernate** mode. See **Using Hibernate Mode (page 92)**. This power saving mode saves you the time of shutting down in the normal way.

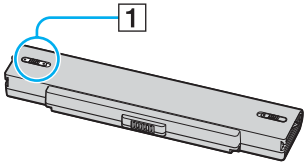
Using the Battery Pack

The battery pack supplied with your computer is not fully charged at the time of purchase.

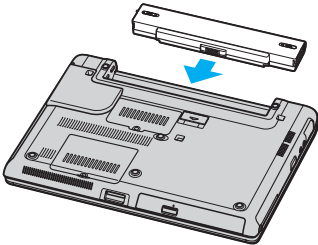
Installing the Battery Pack

To install the battery pack

- 1 Turn off your computer and close the LCD screen lid.
- 2 Slide the lock switch (1) to the **UNLOCK** position.



- 3 Slide the battery into the battery compartment until it clicks into place.



- 4 Slide the lock switch (1) to the **LOCK** position to secure the battery on the computer.



When the computer is directly connected to AC power and has a battery pack installed, it uses power from the AC outlet.

Charging the Battery Pack

The battery pack supplied with your computer is not fully charged at the time of purchase.

To charge the battery pack

- 1 Install the battery pack.
- 2 Connect the AC adapter to the computer.
The computer automatically charges the battery (the battery indicator light flashes in a double blink pattern as the battery charges).

<i>Battery indicator light status</i>	<i>Meaning</i>
On	The computer is using battery power.
Blinks	The battery is running out of power.
Double blinks	The battery is charging.
Off	The computer is using AC power.



When the battery is running out of power, both the battery and power indicator lights blink.

Keep the battery pack in the computer while it is directly connected to AC power. The battery pack continues to charge while you are using the computer.

If the battery level falls below 10%, you should either attach the AC adapter to recharge the battery or shut down your computer and install a fully charged battery.

The battery pack supplied with your computer is a lithium ion battery and can be recharged any time. Charging a partially discharged battery does not affect battery life.

The battery indicator light is on while you use the battery pack as a power source. When the battery life is nearly depleted, both the battery and power indicator lights start flashing.

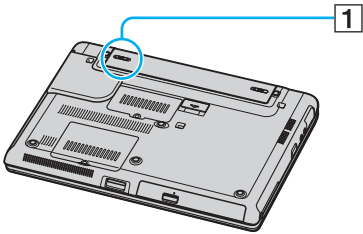
For some software applications and some peripheral devices, your computer may not enter **Hibernate** mode even when battery life is low. To avoid loss of data when using battery power, you should save your data frequently and manually activate a power management mode, such as **Standby** or **Hibernate**. If the battery wears out when your computer enters **Standby** mode, you will lose any unsaved data. Going back to the previous work state is impossible. To avoid loss of data, you should save your data frequently.

When the computer is directly connected to AC power and has a battery pack installed, it uses power from the AC outlet.

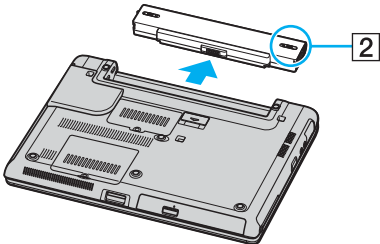
Removing the Battery Pack

To remove the battery pack

- 1 Turn off your computer and close the LCD screen lid.
- 2 Slide the lock switch (1) to the **UNLOCK** position.



- 3 Slide and hold the release latch (2) and slide the battery away from the computer.



You may lose data if you remove the battery pack while the computer is on and not connected to the AC adapter or if you remove the battery while the computer is in **Standby** mode.

Shutting Down Your Computer Safely

To avoid losing unsaved data, be sure to shut down your computer properly, as described below.

To shut down your computer

- 1 Turn off any peripherals connected to your computer.
- 2 Click **Start** and then **Turn Off Computer**.
The **Turn off computer** window appears.
- 3 Click **Turn Off**.
- 4 Respond to any prompts warning you to save documents or to consider other users and wait for your computer to turn off automatically.
The power indicator light turns off.



Using the Keyboard

Your keyboard is very similar to a desktop computer's, but has additional keys that perform model-specific tasks.

Combinations and Functions with the Fn Key

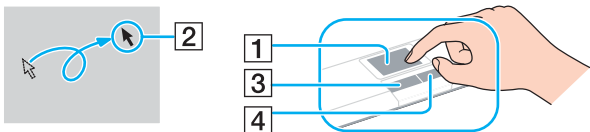
Combinations/Feature	Functions
Fn +  (F2): speaker switch	Turns on and off the built-in speakers and the headphones.
Fn +  (F3/F4): speaker volume	Adjusts the built-in speaker volume. To increase volume, press Fn+F4 and then ↑ or → , or keep pressing Fn+F4 . To decrease volume, press Fn+F3 and then ↓ or ← , or keep pressing Fn+F3 .
Fn +  (F5/F6): brightness control	Adjusts the brightness of the LCD. To increase lightness intensity, press Fn+F6 and then ↑ or → , or keep pressing Fn+F6 . To decrease lightness intensity, press Fn+F5 and then ↓ or ← , or keep pressing Fn+F5 .
Fn +  /  (F7): switch to the external display	Toggles between the LCD, external device (e.g. monitor) and both LCD and external device.
Fn +  (F12): Hibernate	Provides for the lowest level of power consumption. When you execute this command, the states of the system and of the peripheral devices are written to the hard disk and the system power is turned off. To return the system to its original state, use the power switch to turn on the power. For details on power management, see the section Using the Power Saving Modes (page 89).



Some functions are not available until Windows is launched.

Using the Touch Pad



The keyboard contains a cursor-pointing device, your touch pad (1). You can point to, select, drag, and scroll objects on the screen using the touch pad.



<i>Action</i>	<i>Description</i>
Point	Slide one finger on the touch pad to place the pointer (2) on an item or object.
Click	Press the left button (3) once.
Double-click	Press the left button twice.
Right-click	Press the right button (4) once. In many applications, this action displays a shortcut menu.
Drag	Slide one finger while pressing the left button.
Scroll	Move your finger along the right edge of the touch pad to scroll vertically. Move your finger along the bottom to scroll horizontally (the scroll function is available only with applications that support a touch pad scroll feature).

Using Special-function Buttons

Your VAIO computer is provided with special buttons to help you use specific functions of the computer.

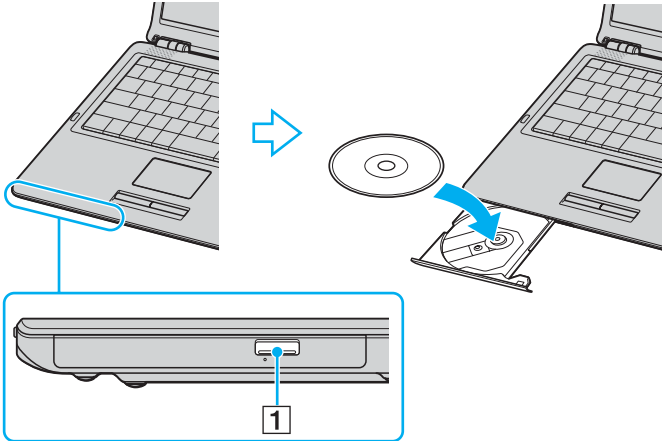
<i>Special-function button</i>	<i>Functions</i>
S1/S2 buttons  	By default, the S1 button turns on and off the volume and the S2 button toggles the display output between the LCD and external device. You can also link to these shortcut buttons another action that you execute often. See Setting Up Your Computer with VAIO Control Center (page 87).

Using the Optical Disc Drive

Your computer is equipped with an optical disc drive.

To insert a disc

- 1 Turn on the computer.
- 2 Press the drive eject button (1) to open the drive.
The tray slides out.
- 3 Place a disc in the middle of the tray with the label side facing up until the disc clicks into place.



- 4 Close the tray by pushing it in gently.



Do not remove the optical disc drive when the computer is in a power saving mode (**Standby** or **Hibernate**). Doing so may cause the computer to malfunction.



If you plan to use an external optical disc drive, connect the drive before you launch any preinstalled CD/DVD program.



See the printed **Troubleshooting Guide** if you have problems using discs.

The location of the drive eject button depends on the model you purchased. See the printed **Specifications** sheet for details on your model.

Reading and Writing CDs and DVDs

Your computer plays and records CDs and DVDs, depending on the model you purchased. Check your specifications for the type of optical disc drive installed on your computer. Use the table below to see which types of media your optical disc drive supports.

CD-ROM	CD, CD-R, and CD-RW	—

! This product is designed to playback discs that conform to the Compact Disc Digital Audio standard specifications (CD Standard). A DualDisc is a two sided disc product which mates DVD recorded material on one side with digital audio material on the other side. Please be aware that the audio side (non-DVD side) of a DualDisc may not play on this product because it does not conform to the CD Standard.

! Due to the multiple formats of discs now available, when buying pre-recorded or blank discs for use with a Sony VAIO computer, be sure to read the notices on the disc packaging carefully to check both playback and recording compatibility with your computer's optical disc drives. Sony does NOT guarantee the compatibility of VAIO CD drives with discs that not compliant with the official "CD" format standard (or "DVD" standard in relation to DVD drives). **USING NON-COMPLIANT DISCS CAN CAUSE FATAL DAMAGE TO YOUR VAIO PC OR CREATE SOFTWARE CONFLICTS AND CAUSE SYSTEM HANGING.** For inquiries about disc formats, contact the individual publisher of the pre-recorded disc or the manufacturer of the recordable disc.

Notes on writing data onto a disc

- ❑ To make the data on a disc readable on an optical disc drive, you need to close the session when you eject it. To complete this process, follow the instructions included with your software.
- ❑ Only use circular discs. Do not use discs in any other shape (star, heart, card, etc.), as this may damage the optical disc drive.
- ❑ Do not strike or shake the computer while writing data onto a disc.
- ❑ Deactivate the screen saver and exit anti-virus software before writing data onto a disc.
- ❑ Do not use memory-resident utility software while writing data to a disc. This may cause the computer to malfunction.
- ❑ When using your software application to burn discs, make sure you exit and close all other applications.
- ❑ Never touch the surface of the disc. Fingerprints and dust on the surface of a disc may cause writing errors.
- ❑ Do not switch power modes while using the pre-installed software and while using the CD burning software.
- ❑ Never put stickers on discs. This will affect the use of the disc irreparably.
- ❑ Connect and use the AC adapter to power your computer or make sure your battery is at least 50 percent charged.
- ❑ Some DVD players and computer's DVD drives may not be able to play DVDs created by the **VAIO Zone** software.



Ultra-speed CD-RW is supported.

Supports writing to DVD-RW discs compliant with DVD-RW version 1.1/1.2.*

Supports 8cm disc reading, but does not support 8cm disc writing.

Because the maximum writing speed to DVD+R DL (Double Layer) discs is 2.4x speed, it may take a while to finish writing to such discs.*

* Depending on the model you purchased. See the printed **Specifications** sheet to see whether your model is equipped with the optical disc drive capable of DVD writing.

Notes on playing DVDs

To achieve optimum performance when playing DVDs, you should follow these recommendations.

- ❑ You can play DVDs using the optical disc drive and the **VAIO Zone** software. See the help file on the **VAIO Zone** software for details.
- ❑ Close all open applications before playing a DVD movie.
- ❑ Do not use memory-resident utility software to speed up disc access when playing a DVD. This may cause the computer to malfunction.
- ❑ Deactivate the screen saver and exit anti-virus software before playing a disc.
- ❑ Some discs recorded at 20 or 24 bits may produce noise while playing. If you have audio devices connected, this may damage your hearing and the speakers. Reduce the volume before playing a DVD.
- ❑ Do not switch power saving modes while the computer is playing a DVD.
- ❑ Region codes indicators are labeled on the DVDs to indicate in which region and on what type of player you can play the disc. Unless a "2" (Europe belongs to region "2") or "all" (this means that you can play this DVD in most regions of the world) is labeled on your DVD disc or on the packaging, you cannot play the disc on this player.

!

If you change the DVD region code while the **WinDVD** software is running, restart the software or eject the disc and re-insert it to make the new setting effective.

- ❑ Do not try to change the region code settings of the DVD drive. Any difficulties caused by changing the region code settings of the DVD drive are out of warranty.
- ❑ If your computer has Wireless LAN and Wireless LAN is activated, playing DVDs may cause some interruptions in audio and video.
- ❑ When you are playing a DVD (video or audio) and you want to remove a USB device, such as USB-compatible speakers, make sure you stop the DVD first. Removing a USB-compatible device during DVD (video or audio) playback may cause a malfunction.

Playing CDs

To play an audio CD

- 1 Insert the disc into the optical disc drive.
- 2 If nothing appears on the desktop once you insert an audio CD disc, then click **Start**, point to **All Programs**, and click to open a CD program, such as the **SonicStage** software.
If the **Audio CD** window appears, click to select an option.

Copying Files to CDs

To determine which type of CD your computer supports, see **Reading and Writing CDs and DVDs** ([page 28](#)).

To copy files to a CD-RW or CD-R

- 1 Insert a blank CD-R or CD-RW disc into the optical disc drive.
If the **CD Drive** window appears, click **Take no action**.
- 2 Open Windows Explorer by pressing the **Windows** key and the **E** key simultaneously.
- 3 In the **Folders** panel on the left, locate the file(s) or folder(s) you want to copy and either:
 - Right-click the file(s) or folder(s), point to **Send To**, and click the optical disc drive* name.
 - Drag the file(s) or folder(s) onto the optical disc drive icon in the **Files Stored on This Computer** panel.
- 4 Close Windows Explorer.
- 5 Click **Start** and then **My Computer**.
- 6 Click the optical disc drive icon under **Devices with Removable Storage**. A new window appears with the file(s) or folder(s) you want to copy listed under **Files Ready to Be Written to the CD**.
- 7 In the **CD Writing Tasks** box, click **Write these files to CD**.
- 8 Follow the instructions in the **CD Writing Wizard**.

* The read/write drive letter designation may vary, depending on your system's hardware configuration.

Playing DVDs

To play a DVD

- 1 Close all open programs.
- 2 Insert the DVD into the optical disc drive.
- 3 Click **Start** and point to **All Programs**.
- 4 Select a DVD software program to play the DVD.

For instructions on how to use a program, see the help guide included with the DVD software program.

Copying Files to DVDs

To copy files to a DVD-R or DVD-RW

- 1 Connect the AC adapter to the computer.
- 2 Insert the disc into the optical disc drive.
- 3 Click **Start** and point to **All Programs**.
- 4 Select a DVD software program you want to use from the submenu.

For instructions on how to use a program, see the help guide included with the DVD software program.

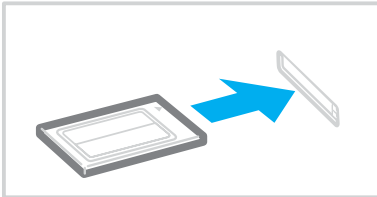
Using PC Cards

PC Cards allow you to connect portable external devices.

Inserting a PC Card

To insert a PC Card

- 1 Insert the PC Card into the PC Card slot with the front label facing up.
- 2 Gently push the PC Card into the slot.
The PC Card is automatically detected by your system.
The **Safely Remove Hardware** icon appears on the taskbar.





Some devices may not function properly if you repeat returning to **Normal** mode from **Standby** mode or **Hibernate** mode. For some PC Cards, if you alternate between **Normal** mode and **Standby** or **Hibernate** mode while the card is inserted, you may find that a device connected to your system is not recognized. Restart your system to correct the problem. Restarting will restore the original state of the computer.

While the card is inserted, your computer may not enter **Hibernate** power management mode. It may enter **Standby** mode. It is recommended that you remove the card before your computer enters **Hibernate** mode.

Some PC Cards or their functions may not be compatible with your computer.

If your computer has two PC Card slots:

- They can accommodate (at the same time) two Type I, two Type II or one Type III PC Card. These slots are compatible with CardBus ports.
- Use the lower slot for Type III PC Cards.
- Always use the same slot for a PC Card. Switching slots can cause problems with some PC Cards.

Make sure you use the most recent software driver provided by the PC Card manufacturer.

If an "!" mark appears on the **Device Manager** tab in the **System Properties** window, remove the software driver and then reinstall it.

Do not force a PC Card into the slot. It may damage the connector pins. If you have difficulty inserting a PC Card, check that you are inserting the PC Card in the correct direction. See the manual supplied with your PC Card for more information on use.

Do not carry your computer while touching the head of a PC Card, as pressure or shock may damage the connector pins.

You do not need to shut down your computer before inserting or removing a PC Card.

Removing a PC Card

Follow the steps below to remove the PC Card while your computer is on. If it is not removed properly, your system may not work properly.

To remove a PC Card



To remove a PC Card when your computer is off, skip steps 1 to 7.

- 1 Double-click the **Safely Remove Hardware** icon on the taskbar.
The **Safely Remove Hardware** window appears.
- 2 Select the hardware you want to unplug.
- 3 Click **Stop**.
The **Stop a Hardware Device** window appears.
- 4 Confirm that the device can be safely removed from the system.
- 5 Click **OK**.
A window appears, explaining that it is safe to remove the device.
- 6 Click **OK**.
- 7 Click **Close**.
- 8 Push the PC Card release button so that the release button pops out.
- 9 Push the PC Card release button a second time so that the PC Card pops out.
- 10 Gently take hold of the Card and pull it out of the slot.
- 11 If the PC Card release button is still out, push it back in.



If you remove the PC Card from the computer when it is still turned on, your system might crash and you might lose any unsaved data.

Before you remove the PC Card, click the PC Card icon on the taskbar and close the card. Close any applications that use the PC Card before removing the card. Otherwise, data may be lost.

Using the Memory Stick Media

Your VAIO computer supports the Memory Stick media. Memory Stick media is a compact, portable, and versatile device especially designed for exchanging and sharing digital data with compatible products, such as digital cameras, mobile phones and other devices. Because it is removable, it can be used for external data storage.

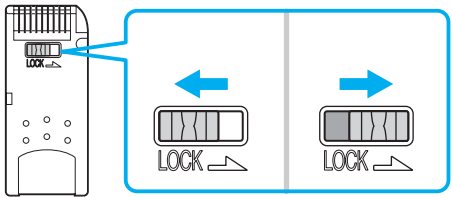

Write-protecting a Memory Stick Media

Some versions of Memory Stick media are designed with an erasure prevention switch to protect valuable data from accidental erasure or overwriting.

Move the tab horizontally or vertically* to set or release write-protection. When the erasure prevention switch is off, data can be saved on the Memory Stick media. When the erasure prevention switch is on, data can be read from but not saved on the Memory Stick media.



* Some versions of Memory Stick media do not have an erasure prevention switch.

Inserting a Memory Stick Media

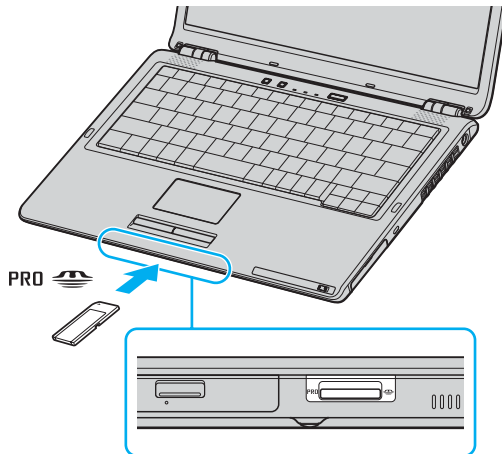
There are two ways you can insert a Memory Stick media into your computer:

- ❑ Using the Memory Stick media slot;
- ❑ Using a PC Card slot. To do this, you need an optional PC Card adapter.

You can only insert one Memory Stick media at a time.

To insert a Memory Stick media using the Memory Stick media slot

- 1 Insert the Memory Stick media with the arrow facing up and toward the Memory Stick media slot.
- 2 Carefully slide the Memory Stick media into the slot until it clicks in place.
The Memory Stick media is automatically detected by your system and appears in your **My Computer** window as a local drive, under the appropriate letter (depending on the configuration of your computer).





The location of the Memory Stick media slot depends on the model you purchased. See the printed **Specifications** sheet for details on your model.



Be sure to hold the Memory Stick media with the arrow pointing in the correct direction as you insert it into the slot. To avoid damaging the computer or the Memory Stick media, do not force the Memory Stick media into the slot if it does not insert smoothly.

Do not insert more than one Memory Stick media into the Memory Stick media slot. Inserting the media improperly may damage the computer.

Viewing the Contents

Depending on the model you purchased, the **Memory Stick** window may appear when you insert a Memory Stick media. From this window, you can choose to view, print, copy or organize your images or data stored on the Memory Stick media. If the **Memory Stick** window does not appear when you insert the Memory Stick media, follow these steps:

To view the contents

- 1 Click **Start** and then **My Computer**.
The **My Computer** window appears.
- 2 Click **Memory Stick**.
The **Memory Stick** window appears, displaying the contents stored on the Memory Stick media.

Formatting a Memory Stick Media

Memory Stick media is formatted for immediate use when you purchase it. If you need to reformat Memory Stick media, use the **Memory Stick Formatter** software that is provided with the media. For more information about using Memory Stick Formatter, see the help file of **Memory Stick Formatter**.



Formatting Memory Stick media erases all data previously saved to it. Before you reformat Memory Stick media, confirm that the media does not contain files you want to keep. Back up important data before formatting the media.

To format a Memory Stick media

- 1 Click **Start**, point to **All Programs, Memory Stick Utility**, and click **Memory Stick Formatter**. The **Memory Stick Formatter** window appears.
- 2 Click **Start Format**, and follow the on-screen instructions.
- 3 After formatting, click **Exit**.

Removing a Memory Stick Media

To remove a Memory Stick media using the Memory Stick media slot

- 1 Check that the Memory Stick media indicator is off.
- 2 Push the Memory Stick media in toward the computer. The Memory Stick media ejects.
- 3 Pull the Memory Stick media out of the slot.



Always remove the Memory Stick media gently, or it may pop out unexpectedly.


Do not remove the Memory Stick media while the Memory Stick media indicator is turned on. If you do, you may lose data. Large volumes of data may take time to load, so be sure the indicator is off before removing the Memory Stick media.

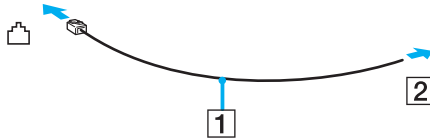
Using the Internet

Setting Up a Dial-up Internet Connection

Before you can connect to the Internet, you need to connect your computer to a telephone line via a telephone cable (not supplied). Once you set up your telephone cable, you're ready to connect to the Internet.

To connect a telephone cable

- 1 Plug one end of the phone cable (1) into the modem port  on the computer.
- 2 Plug the other end into the wall jack (2).



Your computer does not work with party lines, cannot be connected to a coin-operated telephone, and may not work with multiple telephone lines or a private branch exchange (PBX). Some of these connections may result in excess electrical current and could cause a malfunction in the internal modem.

If you connect a telephone cable coming through a splitter, the modem or connected device may not work properly.

To set up a dial-up connection to the Internet

- 1 Click **Start**, point to **All Programs, Accessories, Communications**, and click **New Connection Wizard**. The **New Connection Wizard** appears.
- 2 Click **Next**. If the **Location Information** window appears, follow the on-screen instructions.
- 3 If it is not already selected, click to select **Connect to the Internet**, and click **Next**.
- 4 Follow the on-screen instructions.

Using Wireless LAN (WLAN)

Using the Sony Wireless LAN (WLAN), all your digital devices with built-in WLAN functionality communicate freely with each other through a powerful network. A WLAN is a network in which a user can connect to a local area network (LAN) through a wireless (radio) connection. So there is no need anymore to pull cables or wires through walls and ceilings.

The Sony WLAN supports all normal Ethernet activities, but with the added benefits of mobility and roaming. You can still access information, internet/intranet and network resources, even in the middle of a meeting, or as you move from one place to another.

You can communicate without an Access Point, which means that you can communicate between a limited number of computers (**ad-hoc**). Or you can communicate through an Access Point, which allows you to create a full infrastructure network (**infrastructure**).



In some countries, using WLAN products may be restricted by the local regulations (e.g. limited number of channels). Therefore, before activating the WLAN functionality, read the **Wireless LAN Regulation** carefully. Channel selection is explained further in this manual (see **Wireless LAN Channel Selection (page 50)**).

WLAN uses the IEEE802.11b/g standard, which specifies the used technology. The standard includes the encryption method: **Wired Equivalent Privacy (WEP)**, which is a security protocol and **WiFi Protected Access (WPA - Proposed jointly by the IEEE and Wi-Fi Alliance, WiFi Protected Access is a specification of standards based, interoperable security enhancements that increase the level of data protection and access control for existing WiFi networks. WPA has been designed to be forward compatible with the IEEE802.11i specification. It utilizes the enhanced data encryption TKIP (Temporal Key Integrity Protocol) in addition to user authentication using 802.1X and EAP (Extensible Authentication Protocol)). Data encryption protects the vulnerable wireless link between clients and Access Points. Besides that, there are other typical LAN security mechanisms to ensure privacy, such as: password protection, end-to-end encryption, virtual private networks, and authentication.**

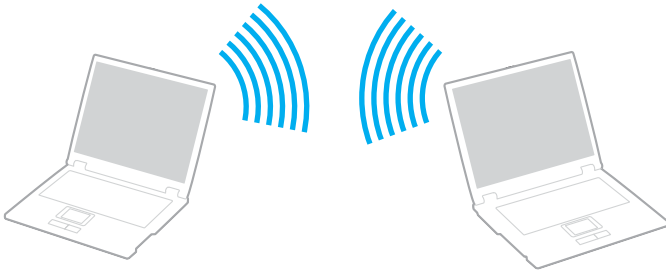
Wireless LAN devices using the IEEE802.11a standard and the ones using the IEEE802.11b or g standard cannot communicate because the frequencies are different.

IEEE802.11b: The standard speed is 11 Mbps, or about 30 to 100 times faster than a standard dial up.

IEEE802.11a/g: The standard speed is 54 Mbps, or about 5 times faster than a Wireless LAN device using the IEEE802.11b standard.




Communicating without an Access Point (Ad-hoc)

An ad-hoc network is a network in which a local network is created only by the wireless devices themselves, with no other central controller or Access Point. Each device communicates directly with other devices in the network. You can set up an ad-hoc network easily at home.



To communicate without an Access Point (ad-hoc)

- 1 Turn on the **WIRELESS** (on models with the Bluetooth functionality^{*1}) or **WIRELESS LAN** (on models without the Bluetooth functionality) switch.

On models with the Bluetooth functionality, double-click  ( / ) on the taskbar to display the **Wireless Device Switch** window. Select the **Enable 2.4 GHz Wireless LAN** check box and click **OK**.

- 2 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 3 Click **Network and Internet Connections**.
- 4 Click **Network Connections**.
The **Network Connections** window appears.
- 5 Right-click **Wireless Network Connection**, then click **Properties**.
The **Wireless Network Connection Properties** window appears.
- 6 Select the **Wireless Networks** tab.
- 7 Click the **Add...** button.
The **Wireless network properties** window appears.
- 8 Enter a **Network name (SSID)**^{*2}.
You can choose a **32-digit** alphanumeric name.
- 9 Select **Open** from the **Network Authentication** drop-down box.
- 10 Select **WEP** from the **Data Encryption** drop-down box.
- 11 Deselect the **The key is provided for me automatically** option button.
Some information becomes visible.
- 12 Enter the **Network key**^{*2}.

The network key should be **5 or 13 alphanumeric characters** or **10 or 26 hexadecimal**^{*3} **characters** long. You can choose whatever you want.

- 13 Enter exactly the same **Network key** again, for confirmation.
- 14 Select the check box **This is a computer-to-computer (ad hoc) network; wireless access points are not used** at the bottom of the screen.
- 15 Click **OK**.
Your **Network name** appears in the **Preferred networks**.
- 16 Click **Advanced**.
The **Advanced** window appears.
- 17 Select the **Computer-to-computer (ad hoc) networks only** option button.
- 18 Click **Close**.
- 19 Click **OK**.
Your computer is ready to communicate with another computer.

*1 See the printed **Specifications** sheet to see whether your model is equipped with the Bluetooth functionality.

*2 If you want to communicate between two or more computers, you need to configure all these computers the exact same way. This means that you need to enter the same **Network name** and the same **Network key** on all computers as on the first computer you configure.

*3 **Hexadecimal**: A number representation using the digits 0-9, with their usual meaning, plus the letters A-F (or a-f) to represent hexadecimal digits with values of (decimal) 10 to 15.



An ad-hoc network does not support WPA.



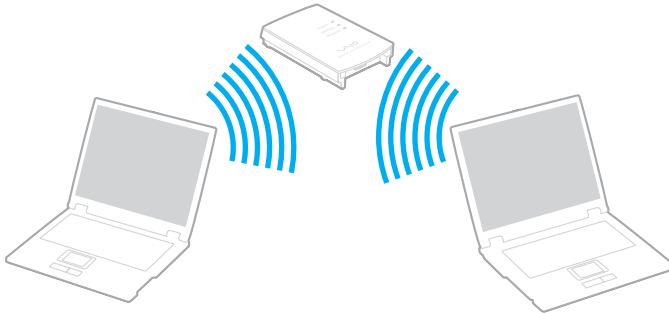

To disconnect from a computer-to-computer (ad-hoc) network

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Network and Internet Connections**.
- 3 Click **Network Connections**.
The **Network Connections** window appears.
- 4 In the right panel under **LAN or High-Speed Internet**, double-click **Wireless Network Connection**.
The **Wireless Network Connection Status** window appears.
- 5 Click **Properties**.
The **Wireless Network Connection Properties** window appears.
- 6 On the **Wireless Networks** tab, click **Advanced**.
The **Advanced** window appears.
- 7 Click to select **Any available network (access point preferred)**, and click **Close**.
- 8 Click **OK**.
- 9 Click **Close**.
- 10 Turn off the **WIRELESS** or **WIRELESS LAN** switch.




Communicating with an Access Point (Infrastructure)

An infrastructure network is a network that extends an existing wired local network to wireless devices by providing an Access Point, for example the **Sony Access Point**. The Access Point bridges the wireless and wired LAN and acts as a central controller for the Wireless LAN. The Access Point coordinates transmission and reception from multiple wireless devices within a specific range.



To connect to a wireless network

- 1 Turn on the **WIRELESS** (on models with the Bluetooth functionality^{*}) or **WIRELESS LAN** (on models without the Bluetooth functionality) switch.

On models with the Bluetooth functionality, double-click  ( / ) on the taskbar to display the **Wireless Device Switch** window. Select the **Enable 2.4 GHz Wireless LAN** check box and click **OK**.

- 2 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 3 Click **Network and Internet Connections**.
- 4 Click **Network Connections**.
The **Network Connections** window appears.
- 5 In the right panel under **LAN or High-Speed Internet**, double-click **Wireless Network Connection**.
The **Wireless Network Connection** window appears.
- 6 Select the network you want to use.
- 7 Enter the **Network Key**.
- 8 Click **Connect**.
After 30 seconds, the connection is established.

* See the printed **Specifications** sheet to see whether your model is equipped with the Bluetooth functionality.

For more information about setting up an access point, see the documentation supplied with your **Access Point**.



The WPA key needs to contain at least 8 characters.

Wireless LAN Channel Selection

In an 802.11b/g configuration, channel 1 to 13 can be used.

(a) With an Access Point ("Infrastructure")

- The channel used will be the channel selected by the Access Point.

! For details on how to select the channel that will be used by the Access Point, see the access point manual.

(b) Without an Access Point ("ad-hoc")

- If the Wireless connection is initiated by the VAIO computer, channel 11 will be selected.

! In France, only certain channels are legally allowed when using WLAN outdoors. For more information, see the **Wireless LAN Regulations**.

- If the Wireless connection is initiated by a peer Wireless LAN equipment, the Wireless LAN communication will make use of the channel selected by the peer Wireless LAN equipment.



The 2.4 GHz bandwidth used by wireless LAN compatible devices is also used by other various devices. Although technologies to minimize interference from other devices that uses the same bandwidth are employed on wireless LAN compatible devices, such interference may cause lower communication speed, narrower communication range, or broken wireless connections.

The communication speed varies depending on the distance between communication devices, existence of obstacles between such devices, the device configuration, the radio conditions, and the software in use. In addition, communications may be cut off depending on the radio conditions.

The communication range varies depending on the actual distance between communication devices, existence of obstacles between such devices, the radio conditions, the ambient environment that includes existence of walls and materials of such walls, and the software in use.

Deploying IEEE802.11b and IEEE802.11g products on the same wireless network may reduce the communication speed due to radio interference. Taking this into consideration, the IEEE802.11g products are designed to reduce the communication speed to ensure communications with IEEE802.11b products. When the communication speed is not as fast as expected, changing the wireless channel on the access point may increase the communication speed.

Using the Bluetooth Functionality (on Selected Models Only)

You can establish wireless communication between your computer and other Bluetooth devices such as another computer or a mobile phone. You can transfer data between these devices without cables and up to 10 meters range in open space.

See the printed **Specifications** sheet to see whether your model is equipped with the Bluetooth functionality.

To connect to a Bluetooth device

- 1 Turn on the **WIRELESS** switch.
- 2 Double-click  on the taskbar to display the **Wireless Device Switch** window.
- 3 Select the **Bluetooth** option.
- 4 Click **OK**.

Notes on using the Bluetooth functionality

- ❑ The data transfer rate varies, depending on the following conditions:
 - ❑ Obstacles, such as walls, located between devices
 - ❑ Distance between devices
 - ❑ Material used in walls
 - ❑ Proximity to microwaves and cordless telephones
 - ❑ Radio frequency interference and other environmental conditions
 - ❑ Device configuration
 - ❑ Type of software application
 - ❑ Type of operating system
 - ❑ Use of both Wireless LAN and Bluetooth functionalities at the same time on the computer
 - ❑ Size of file being exchanged
- ❑ Note that due to limitations of the Bluetooth standard, large files may occasionally be corrupted during continuous transfer due to electromagnetic interference from the environment.
- ❑ All Bluetooth devices must be certified to make sure that the applicable standard requirements are maintained. Even if standards are met, individual device performance, specifications, and operation procedures can vary. Data exchange may not be possible in all situations.

- ❑ The 2.4 GHz band with which Bluetooth devices or wireless LAN devices work, is used by various devices. Bluetooth devices use the technology to minimize the interference from other devices that use the same wave length. Communication speed and distances can be inferior to the standard values. Interference from other devices may also stop communications. Do not simultaneously use the Bluetooth functionality and wireless communication devices which use the 2.4 GHz band, such as a wireless LAN PC Card.



Read the **Regulations Guide** before using the Bluetooth functionality.

- ❑ The Bluetooth functionality may not work depending on the third party devices or the software version used by third party companies.

Bluetooth Security

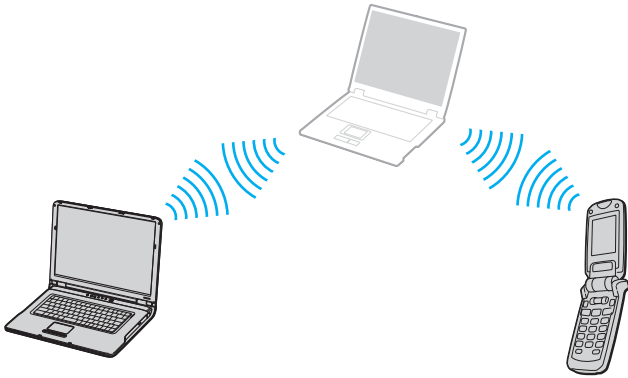
The Bluetooth wireless technology has an authentication function, which allows you to determine whom you choose to communicate. With the authentication function, you can avoid any anonymous Bluetooth device to access your computer.

The first time two Bluetooth devices communicate, a common **Passkey** (a password required for authentication) should be determined for both devices to be registered. Once a device is registered, there is no need to re-enter the **Passkey**.

To avoid being detected by other Bluetooth devices, you can change the Bluetooth settings, as described on the following pages.

Communicating with Another Bluetooth Device

You can connect your computer to a Bluetooth device such as another computer or a mobile phone without the use of any cables.



To communicate with another Bluetooth device

- 1 Turn on the **WIRELESS** switch.
- 2 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 3 Click **Network and Internet Connections**.
- 4 Click **Bluetooth Devices**.
The **Bluetooth Device** window appears.
- 5 Click **Add**.
The **Add Bluetooth Device Wizard** window appears.
- 6 Select **My device is set up and ready to be found** and then click **Next**.
- 7 Select the remote device to which you want to connect. If necessary, scroll up and down in the **Bluetooth Device List** to make your selection. Then click **Next**.
- 8 Choose one of the following options:
 - If you want Windows to provide you with a password, select **Choose a Passkey for me**.
 - If the documentation of the other Bluetooth device contains a password, click **Use the passkey found in the documentation** and enter the passkey.
 - If you want to create your own passkey, click **Let me use my own passkey** and enter a passkey.
 - If your device does not use a passkey, click **Don't use a passkey**.
- 9 Click **Next** to continue.
- 10 Once the remote device has been successfully authenticated, click **Finish**.



The passkey can be different each time, but must be the same at both ends.

For certain devices, such as a mouse, no passkey can be entered.

To transfer data from or to another Bluetooth device

- 1 Choose **Start**, point to **All Programs, Accessories, Communications**, and then click **Bluetooth File Transfer Wizard**. The **Bluetooth File Transfer Wizard** window appears.
- 2 Click **Next** to continue.
- 3 Follow the on-line instructions.

To connect to a network with Bluetooth device

With Bluetooth connections, you can join a personal area network (PAN), which is an Internet Protocol (IP)-based network.

- 1 Turn on the **WIRELESS** switch.
- 2 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 3 Click **Network and Internet Connections**.
- 4 Click **Network Connection**.
- 5 Click **Bluetooth Network Connection**.
The **Bluetooth Personal Area Network Device** window appears.
 - If you wish to connect to a Bluetooth device that is not displayed, click **Add**.
 - If you wish to connect to a displayed Bluetooth device, select the device's icon and click **Connect**.
- 6 Follow the on-screen instructions.

Stopping the Bluetooth Connection

To stop the Bluetooth connection, turn off the **WIRELESS** switch. The Bluetooth indicator turns off.

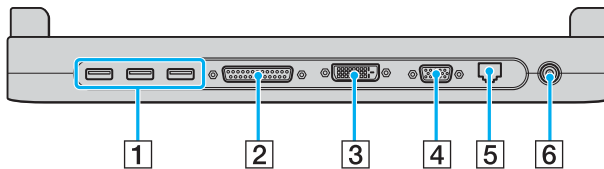
Connecting a Port Replicator

Attaching a port replicator enables you to connect additional peripherals to your computer, such as a printer and an external display.

A port replicator may be delivered with your computer, depending on the model you purchased. If not, you can additionally purchase an optional port replicator.

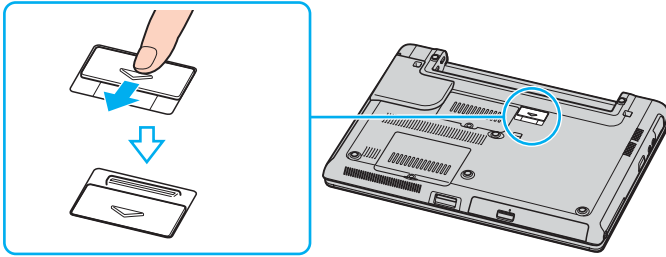

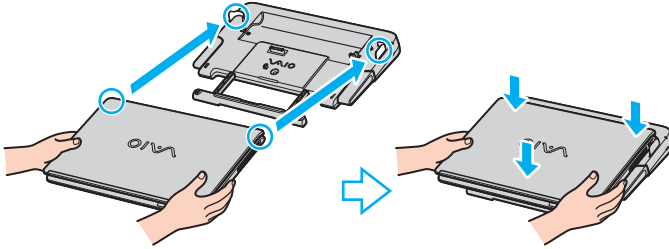
- 4 Open the port replicator connector cover.

- 7 Turn on the computer.



Use the AC adapter that comes with your computer or the optional Sony adapter.



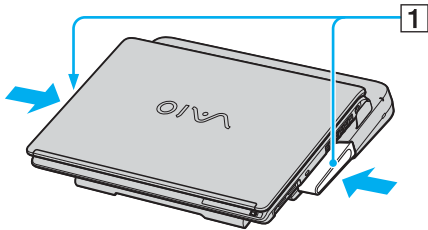
Do not move your computer while attached to the port replicator; this may detach the port replicator and cause damage to the port replicator and the computer.

Disconnecting Your Computer from the Port Replicator

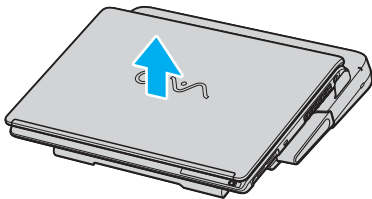
! To prevent loss of unsaved data, be sure to turn off your computer before disconnecting it from the port replicator.

To disconnect your computer from the port replicator

- 1 Turn off the computer and the connected peripherals.
- 2 Push the release buttons (1) at the same time.



- 3 Lift the computer away from the port replicator.



- 4 Close the port replicator connector cover on the bottom of your computer.




It is extremely important to close the port replicator connector cover after disconnecting your computer from the port replicator. If the cover is left open, dust may get inside and damage the computer.

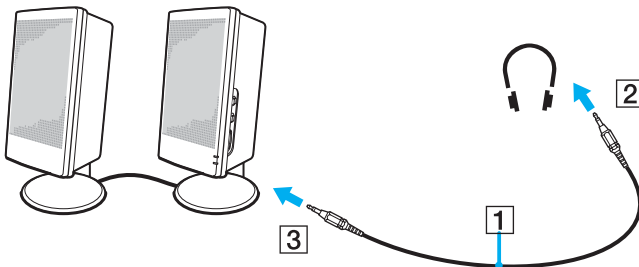
To disconnect your port replicator completely from AC power, unplug the AC adapter.

Connecting External Speakers

You can enhance the sound quality of your computer by connecting external speakers.

To connect external speakers

- 1 Plug the speaker cable (1) into the headphones jack (2) .
- 2 Plug the other end of the speaker cable to the external speaker (3).
- 3 Turn down the volume of the speakers before you turn them on.



Make sure your speakers are designed for computer use.



Do not place floppy disks on the speakers; their magnetic field may damage the data on the disks.

Connected external displays are used as second screens.

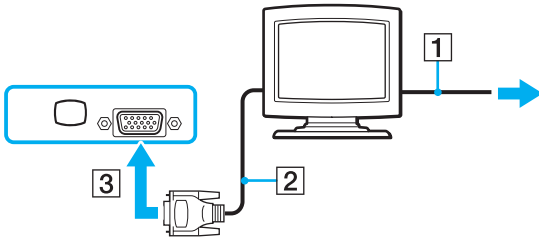
On Windows systems only, you can also use an external display to set up multiple monitors.

Connecting a Computer Display

You can connect a computer display (monitor) either directly to your computer or via the (optional) port replicator.

To connect a computer display

- 1 If necessary, plug one end of the display's power cord (1) into the display, and the other end into an AC outlet.
- 2 If you want to connect a VGA monitor, plug the display cable (2) (not supplied) into the monitor (VGA) port (3) on the computer or on the port replicator.
- 3 If you want to connect a TFT/DVI monitor, plug the display cable (not supplied) into the DVI-D port on the port replicator.



DVI-D stands for **Digital Visual Interface - Digital**. It is a type of DVI connector that supports only digital video signals (no analog video signals). It has 24 pins.

A **DVI-I** connector (**Digital Visual Interface - Integrated**) supports digital video and analog video signals. It has 29 pins.






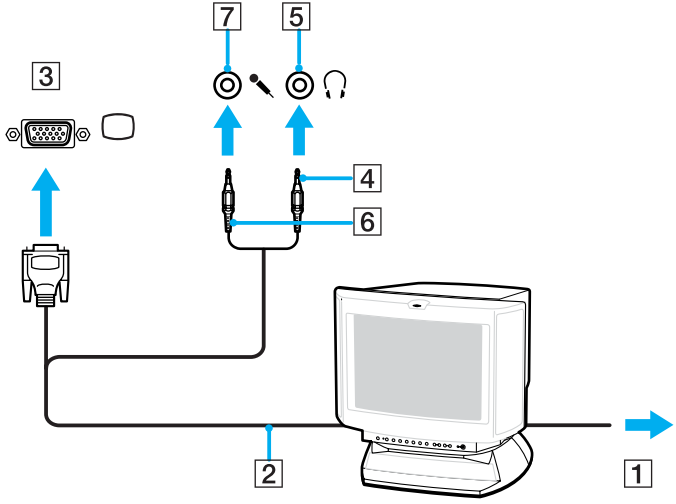
You can not connect a DVI-I to VGA cable to a DVI-D port!

Connecting a Multimedia Computer Display

You can connect the computer to a multimedia computer display that includes built-in speakers and a microphone.

To connect a multimedia computer display

- 1 Plug the power cord of the multimedia computer display (1) into an AC outlet.
- 2 Plug the display cable (2) (not supplied) into the monitor (VGA) port (3)  on the computer or on the (optional) port replicator.
- 3 Plug the speaker cable (4) into the headphones jack (5)  on the computer.
- 4 Plug the microphone cable (6) into the microphone jack (7)  on the computer.

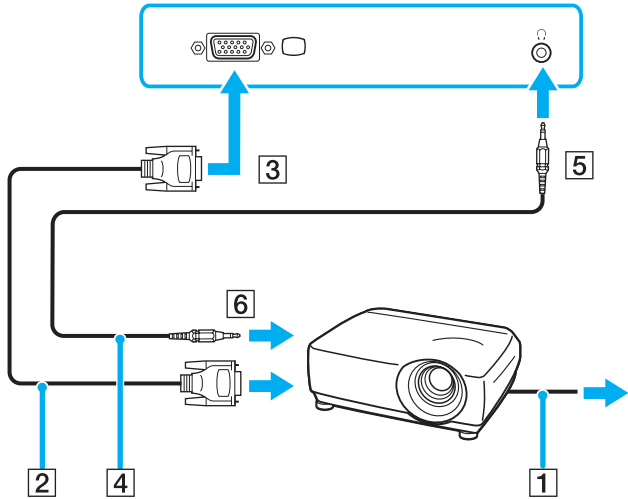


Connecting a Projector

You can connect a projector (such as the Sony LCD projector) directly to your computer or via the port replicator.

To connect a projector

- 1 Connect the power cord (1) of the projector into an AC outlet.
- 2 Plug the RGB signal cable (2) into the monitor (VGA) port (3) on the computer or on the (optional) port replicator.
- 3 Plug the audio cable (4) (not supplied) into the headphones jack (5).
- 4 Plug the RGB signal cable and the audio cable into the jack and port on the projector (6).



Selecting Display Modes

Your computer uses the NVIDIA video controller. You can select which display to be used as the primary monitor when an external display (desktop monitor, etc.) is connected to the computer. If you want to work on your computer's LCD and the external display at the same time, see **Using the Multiple Monitors Function (page 72)** for more information.

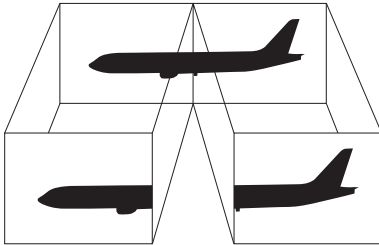

- 7 Select **nView Display Settings** from the left menu.
To change the current display, select the desired display from the **Current display** drop-down list.
To display the output on your computer's LCD and the external display at the same time, select **Clone** from the **nView Display mode** drop-down list.
To specify displays, use the **Primary Display/Secondary Display** drop-down list.
- 8 Click **OK** and then **YES**.

Using the Multiple Monitors Function

The Multiple Monitors function allows you to distribute portions of your desktop across separate displays. For example, if you have an external display attached to the monitor (VGA) port, your computer's LCD and the external display can function as a single desktop.

You can move the cursor from one display to the other. This allows you to drag objects, such as an open application window or a toolbar, from one display to the other.



Your external display may not support the Multiple Monitors function.

Certain software applications may not be compatible with Multiple Monitors settings.

Make sure that your computer does not enter **Standby** or **Hibernate** mode while you are using Multiple Monitors mode; otherwise your computer may not return to **Normal** mode.

If you set different colors on each display, do not divide one single window on two displays; otherwise your software may not work properly.

Set fewer colors or a lower resolution for each display.

To select the Multiple Monitors mode

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Appearance and Themes**.
- 3 Click **Display**.
- 4 Select the **Settings** tab.
- 5 Click **Advanced**.
- 6 Click the tab with its name beginning with **GeForce**.
- 7 Select **nView Display Settings** from the left menu.
- 8 Select **Dualview** from the **nView Display Mode** drop-down list.
- 9 Select **Laptop Display** from the **Primary display** drop-down list.
- 10 Click **OK**.



To deactivate the Multiple Monitors mode, deselect the check box in Step 6.



You can also select and deactivate the Multiple Monitors mode just by pressing one of the **S** buttons if you have changed the button assignment to **Multiple Monitors** with **VAIO Control Center**. For details on changing the button assignment, see **Setting Up Your Computer with VAIO Control Center** ([page 87](#)).




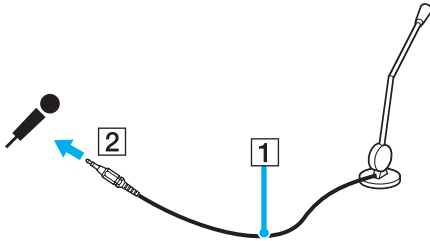
Additionally, you can set the display colors and resolution for each display and customize the Multiple Monitors mode.

Connecting an External Microphone

If you need to use a sound input device (for example, to chat on the Internet) you need to plug in an external microphone.

To connect an external microphone

Plug the microphone cable (1) into the microphone jack (2) .



Make sure your microphone is designed for computer use.


Connecting a Universal Serial Bus (USB) Device

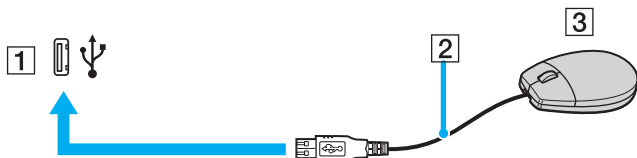
To prevent your computer and/or USB devices from damage, observe the following:

- ❑ When moving your computer with USB devices connected, avoid any shock or force to the USB ports.
- ❑ Do not put your computer into a bag or carrying case when it has USB devices connected.

Connecting a USB Mouse

To connect a USB mouse

- 1 Choose the USB port (1)  you prefer to use.
- 2 Plug the USB mouse cable (2) into the USB port.
You can now use your USB mouse (3).




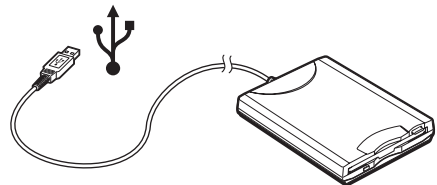
The VAIO USB mouse software driver is preinstalled on your computer. As a result, you only need to plug the USB mouse into the USB port and you can start working.

Connecting a USB Floppy Disk Drive

You can purchase a USB floppy disk drive and connect it to your computer.

To connect a USB floppy disk drive

- 1 Choose the USB port  you prefer to use.
- 2 Plug the USB floppy disk drive cable into the USB port. The VAIO logo on the disk drive should be facing up. Your USB floppy disk drive is now ready for use.



! When using a USB floppy disk drive, do not apply force on the USB port. This may cause a malfunction.

Disconnecting a USB floppy disk drive

You can disconnect a USB floppy disk drive when the computer is on or off. Disconnecting the drive when the computer is in a power saving mode (**Standby** or **Hibernate**) may cause the computer to malfunction.

If your computer is off, you can unplug the USB cable directly from the computer.

To disconnect a USB floppy disk drive

- 1 Close all programs accessing the floppy disk drive.
- 2 Double-click the **Safely Remove Hardware** icon on the taskbar.
The **Safely Remove Hardware** window appears.
- 3 Select the floppy disk drive you want to unplug.
- 4 Click **Stop**.
The **Stop a Hardware device** window appears.
- 5 Make sure the floppy disk drive is selected, and click **OK**. A message appears stating it is now safe to remove the hardware device.
- 6 Remove the floppy disk drive from the computer.

Connecting a Printer

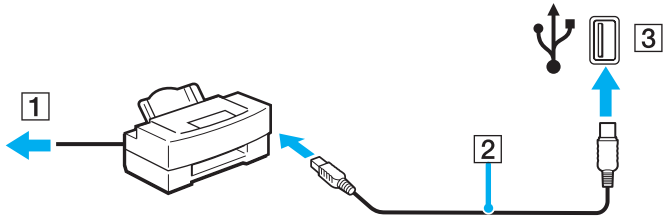
You can connect a Windows-compatible printer to your computer to print documents.

Connecting a Printer Using the USB Port

You can connect a USB printer compatible with your version of Windows to your computer.


To connect a printer using the USB port

- 1 Plug the printer power cord into an AC outlet (1).
- 2 Choose the USB port (3) you prefer to use.
- 3 Plug one end of a USB printer cable (2) into the USB port and the other end to your printer.

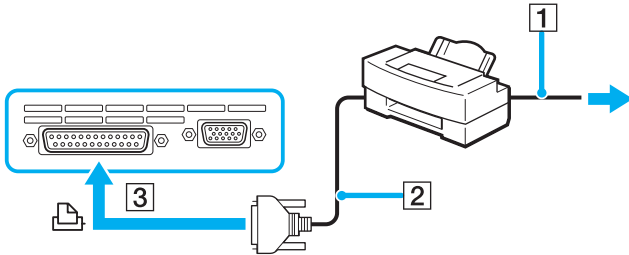


Connecting a Printer Using the Printer Port

To connect a printer using the printer port

- 1 Plug the printer power cord (1) into an AC outlet.
- 2 Plug the printer cable (2) supplied with your printer into the printer port (3)  on the computer or on the (optional) port replicator*.

* Depending on the model you purchased. See the printed **Specifications** sheet for details on your model.



Before connecting the printer, turn off your computer and the printer, and unplug the AC adapter and the power cord.

Connecting an i.LINK Device

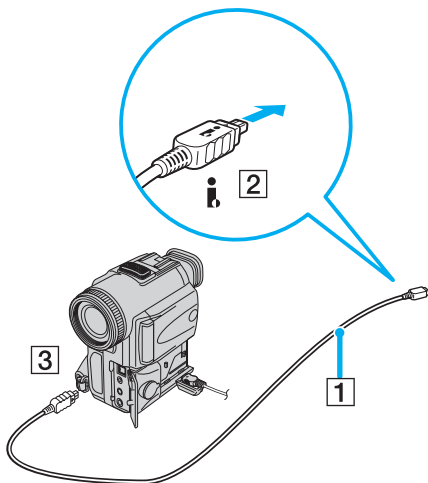
Notes on connecting i.LINK devices

- ❑ Your computer includes an i.LINK (IEEE1394) port, which you can use to connect to an i.LINK device such as a digital video camera recorder or to connect two VAIO computers in order to copy, delete or edit files.
- ❑ The i.LINK port of your computer does not supply power to external devices generally powered by i.LINK ports.
- ❑ The i.LINK port supports transfer rates up to 400 Mbps; however, the actual transfer rate depends on the transfer rate of the external device.
- ❑ i.LINK cables compatible with your VAIO computer include cables with the following part numbers:
VMC-IL4415 (a 1.5 meter cable with a 4-pin connector at each end), VMC-IL4408 Series (a 0.8 meter cable with a 4-pin connector at each end).
- ❑ An i.LINK connection with other compatible devices is not fully guaranteed.
- ❑ The i.LINK connection varies depending on the software applications, operating system and i.LINK compatible devices you use. Refer to the manual that came with your software for more information.
- ❑ Check the working conditions and OS compatibility of i.LINK-compatible PC peripherals (HDD, CD-RW drive etc.) before you connect them to your computer.

Connecting a Digital Video Camera Recorder

To connect a digital video camera recorder

- 1 Plug one end of the i.LINK cable (1) into the i.LINK port (2) on the computer and the other end into the DV In/Out ports (3) on the digital video camera recorder.
- 2 Launch the **DVgate Plus** software.



On Sony digital video cameras, ports labeled **DV Out**, **DV In/Out** or **i.LINK** are i.LINK-compatible.

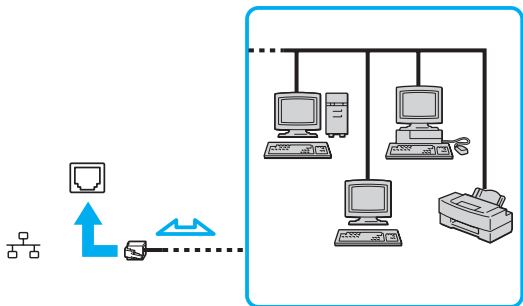
The Sony digital video camera recorder shown here is an example; your digital video camera recorder may need to be connected differently.

You cannot access the pictures stored on a Memory Stick media when using an i.LINK connection.

Connecting to a Network (LAN)

You can connect your computer to 1000BASE-T/100BASE-TX/10BASE-T-type networks* via an Ethernet network cable. Connect one end of an optional network cable to the Network (Ethernet) port on the bottom panel of your computer and the other end to your network. For detailed settings and devices needed to connect to the network, see your Network Administrator.

* Depending on the model you purchased. See the printed **Specifications** sheet to see whether your model supports a 1000BASE-TX connection.



Your computer can be connected to the network with the default settings.

If the main unit is docked, you can only use the Network (Ethernet) port on the optional port replicator.

! Network and telephone lines cannot be connected to the Network (Ethernet) port on your computer. If the following connectors are connected to the telephone lines mentioned below, high electric current to the connectors may cause damage, overheating or fire.

- Home (intercom speakerphone) or business-use telephone lines (multi-line business telephone)
- Network lines such as 1000BASE-T, 100BASE-TX, and 10BASE-T lines (depending on the model you purchased)
- Public telephone subscriber line
- PBX (private branch exchange)
- Lines other than those mentioned above

! Do not plug a phone cable into your computer network port.

Setting the Password

Use one of the BIOS functions to set the password.

Once you have set the password, you will have to enter the password after the VAIO logo appears. In this way, you can protect your computer from unauthorized access.

! You cannot start your computer without entering the password. Make sure not to forget the password.

If you forget the password and need assistance to cancel it, a cancellation fee will be charged.

Adding the Password

To add the password

- 1 Turn on your computer.
- 2 Press the **F2** key when the **VAIO** logo appears.
The BIOS setup screen appears.
- 3 Use the **←** or **→** key to select **Security** to display another screen, select **Set Machine Password**, and then press the **Enter** key.
- 4 On the password entry screen, enter the password **twice** and press the **Enter** key.
The password should be **up to 7 alphanumeric characters** long.



The following is to configure your computer to prompt password entry when you turn on your computer or display the BIOS setup screen.

- 5 Select **Password When Power ON** under **Security**.
Press the space bar to change the setting from **Disabled** to **Enabled**.
- 6 Use the **←** or **→** key to select **Exit** and then **Exit (Save Changes)**; and press the **Enter** key.
On the **Setup Confirmation** screen, confirm that **Yes** is selected and then press the **Enter** key.

Changing/Removing the Password

To change or remove the password

- 1 Turn on your computer.
- 2 Press the **F2** key when the **VAIO** logo appears.
The BIOS setup screen appears.
- 3 Enter the current password for **Enter Password**:
- 4 Use the **←** or **→** key to select **Security** to display another screen, select **Set Machine Password**, and then press the **Enter** key.
- 5 On the password entry screen, enter the **current password once** and then a **new password twice**; and press the **Enter** key.
To remove the password, leave **Enter New Password** and **Confirm New Password** blank and press the **Enter** key.
- 6 Use the **←** or **→** key to select **Exit** and then **Exit (Save Changes)**; and press the **Enter** key.
On the **Setup Confirmation** screen, confirm that **Yes** is selected and then press the **Enter** key.

Setting Up Your Computer with VAIO Control Center

The **VAIO Control Center** utility allows you to consult system information and specify preferences for system behavior.

To use VAIO Control Center

- 1 Click **Start**, point to **All Programs**, and click **VAIO Control Center**.
The **VAIO Control Center** window appears.

<i>Control item</i>	<i>Description</i>
System Information	Displays the information about your operating system and the hardware configuration.
Initial Setting	You can specify the order in which the system checks for devices containing a bootable system when it starts.
Built-in Pointing Device	You can enable or disable the built-in pointing device.
S Button	You can change the functions assigned to the computer's S buttons. Available pre-defined assignments are: Muting^{*1}, Stand by, Hibernate, Max Brightness, External Display^{*2}, Launch Application, VAIO Zone, SSMS Audio Filter, Multiple Monitors, VAIO Power Management Viewer
Plug and Display	You can specify settings for automatic output to the external display.
VAIO Power Management Viewer	You can modify power management settings. You can also adjust the allocation of power consumption by modifying settings on the VAIO Power Management tab. Log on as an administrator to modify any settings.
Wireless Switch Settings ^{*3}	You can select the option of the wireless functionality that is activated when you set the WIRELESS switch on your computer to ON.

^{*1} Default S1 button assignment

^{*2} Default S2 button assignment

^{*3} On selected models only. See the printed **Specifications** sheet to see if your model is equipped with the Bluetooth functionality.

- 2 Select the desired control item and change the settings.
- 3 Once finished, click **OK**.
The setting of the desired item has been changed.



For more information about each option, click **Help** on the **VAIO Control Center** window to display the help file.

Some of the control items will not be visible if you open **VAIO Control Center** as a limited user.

Using the Power Saving Modes

When you use a battery as the power source for your computer, you can take advantage of power management settings to conserve battery life. In addition to the normal operating mode, which allows you to turn off specific devices, your computer has two distinct power saving modes: **Standby** and **Hibernate**. When using battery power, you should be aware that the computer automatically enters **Hibernate** mode when the remaining battery charge becomes short, regardless of the power management setting you select.



If the battery level falls below 10 percent, you should either attach the AC adapter to recharge the battery or shut down your computer and install a fully charged battery.

Using Normal Mode

This is the normal state of your computer when it is in use. The green power indicator light is on in this mode. To save power while not working, you can turn off a specific device such as the LCD or the hard disk.

Using Standby Mode

Standby mode turns off the LCD screen and sets the hard disk and the CPU to a low power consumption mode. The amber power light flashes in this mode.

To activate Standby mode

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Turn Off Computer**.
- 2 Click **Stand By**.

To return to Normal mode

Press any key.



If you press the power button for more than four seconds, the computer will switch off automatically. You will lose any unsaved data.

When the computer is in **Standby** mode, you cannot insert a disc.

The computer comes out of **Standby** mode quicker than out of **Hibernate** mode.

Standby mode uses more power than **Hibernate** mode.

If the battery runs down when your computer enters **Standby** mode, you will lose any unsaved data. Going back to the previous work state is impossible.

To avoid loss of data, you should save your data frequently.

If the computer is not used for 25 minutes, it will enter **Standby** mode. To avoid this, you can change the **Standby** mode settings.

To change the Standby mode settings

- 1 Right-click the **power status** icon on the taskbar.
- 2 Select **Adjust Power Properties**.
The **Power Options Properties** window appears.
- 3 Select the **Power Schemes** tab.
- 4 Change the settings in **Settings for VAIO optimized power scheme**.

Using Hibernate Mode

In **Hibernate** mode, the state of the system is saved on the hard disk and power is turned off. Even when the battery runs down, no data will be lost. The power indicator light is off in this mode.

To activate **Hibernate** mode

Press the **Fn+F12** keys.

The **Hibernating** screen appears and the computer enters **Hibernate** mode.

Alternatively,

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Turn Off Computer**.
- 2 Hold down the **Shift** key and click **Hibernate**.

To return to Normal mode

Turn on the computer by pressing the power button.

The computer returns to its previous state.



If you press the power button for more than four seconds, the computer will switch off automatically.

If you do not use the AC adapter for a long period of time, put your computer into **Hibernate** mode. This power saving mode saves you the time of shutting down in the normal way.

When the computer is in **Hibernate** mode, you cannot insert a disc.

Hibernate mode requires more time than **Standby** mode to be activated.

It takes more time to return to **Normal** mode from **Hibernate** mode than from **Standby** mode.

Hibernate mode uses less power than **Standby** mode.

Do not move the computer until its power indicator turns off.

Managing Power with VAIO Power Management

Power management helps you to set up power schemes for running on AC power or batteries to suit your requirements for power consumption.

VAIO Power Management is a software application developed exclusively for VAIO computers. With this software application, you can enhance the Windows power management functions to ensure better operations of your computer and for longer battery life.

Activating VAIO Power Management

When you start the computer, a **power status** icon appears on the taskbar. This icon indicates what kind of power source you are using at that time, for example, AC power. If you double-click this icon, the **Power Meter** window appears showing you the power status.

VAIO Power Management functionalities are added to the Windows **Power Options Properties**.

To activate VAIO Power Management

- 1 Right-click the **power status** icon on the taskbar.
- 2 Select **Adjust Power Properties**.
The **Power Options Properties** window appears.
- 3 Select the **VAIO Power Management** tab.

To restore the default settings

- 1 On the **VAIO Power Management** tab, click **Advanced**.
The **VAIO Power Management** window appears.
- 2 Click **Reset by default**.
The **Confirm** window appears.
- 3 Select **Restore all power schemes to the original factory default settings**.
- 4 Click **OK**.
The default settings are restored for all the power scheme options.

Activating VAIO Power Management Power Schemes

VAIO Power Management provides several predefined **power schemes**. Each power scheme consists of a group of power management settings that are designed to meet specific power management goals, ranging from maximum power management to no power management.

To activate a VAIO Power Management power scheme

- 1 Right-click the **power status** icon on the taskbar.
- 2 Select **Adjust Power Properties**.
The **Power Options Properties** window appears.
- 3 Select the **Power Schemes** tab.
- 4 Select a power scheme from the **Power schemes** drop-down list.
- 5 If you now select the **VAIO Power Management** tab, you see that the selected power scheme appears to the right of **Power Scheme**.
- 6 If necessary, you can change the items in the list, for example, the brightness of the LCD.
- 7 Click **OK**.
The power scheme has been activated.



You must have computer administrator rights on your computer to set up a power scheme.

For more information on **VAIO Power Management** and **Power Schemes**, see the help guide of the **VAIO Power Management** software.

<i>Power Scheme</i>	<i>Description</i>
Power Management Off	Turns off all power management features such as Standby and Hibernate modes.
VAIO Optimized	The default power management state for either power source.
VAIO Maximum Battery	Provides power saving features to provide maximum battery life and good performance when battery power is in use. It reduces the brightness of the display and puts the system into Standby mode after a specified time period.
VAIO Ultimate Battery	Extends the VAIO Maximum Battery by completely disabling the optical disc drive.



If you have a mobile computer, a CPU control icon may appear on the taskbar. The CPU control icon indicates the CPU control status (Performance, Adaptive, Battery Life). To display the icon, click the **Advanced** button on the **VAIO Power Management** tab. Select the **Show CPU status icon in the taskbar** box and then click **OK**.

For more details on the CPU control icon, see the online help file (**Other Information - Icons on the Notification Area**).

VAIO Power Management Viewer

To start VAIO Power Management Viewer

Click  on the **VAIO Power Management** tab.

Alternatively, you can click **Start**, point to **All Programs** and **VAIO Control Center**, and then click **VAIO Power Management Viewer** to start the viewer.

VAIO Power Management Viewer is provided with two tabs: **Running on batteries** and **Plugged in**. Starting the viewer automatically displays the tab appropriate to the current power scheme of your computer. On each tab, the radar chart shows performance with the current power scheme and the modified power scheme in the designated colors.

To change the power scheme

Select the desired power scheme from the drop-down list on VAIO Power Management Viewer.

To view performance with the power scheme modified with VAIO Power Management

When both **VAIO Power Management** and **VAIO Power Management Viewer** are running, **VAIO Power Management Viewer** shows performance with the power scheme that was modified with **VAIO Power Management**.



Use **VAIO Power Management** to set up or modify the power scheme.

Setting Up Your Language with Windows XP Professional

Windows XP Professional computers are equipped with the **Multilingual User Interface (MUI)** feature. It allows you to change the English operating system, some software applications and the keyboard layout into the language of your choice: **French, German, Japanese, Dutch, Italian, Spanish, Czech, Finnish, Greek, Portuguese** and **Swedish**.

It is important that you select the correct keyboard settings during the Windows Setup.

To select the correct keyboard settings during Windows Setup

- 1 At first boot, click **Next**, then **Next** again in the **Windows XP Setup Wizard** window. The **Select Your System Settings** window appears.
- 2 Fill in these three questions:
 - I live the closest to this region.
 - I type mostly in this language.
 - I use this type of keyboard.
- 3 In the **End User License Agreement**, accept the License Agreement and click **Next**.
- 4 Continue your Windows setup until it is finished.

You can also change the country and language settings into your language as soon as Windows has been restarted.

To change the country and language settings

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 In the **Control Panel** window, double-click the **Regional and Language Options** icon.
If you do not see this icon, click **Switch to Classic View** on the left side.
- 3 In the **Regional Options** tab of the **Regional and Language Options** window, select **your language** from the **Standards and formats** drop-down menu.
- 4 In the **Advanced** tab of the **Regional and Language Options** window, select **your language** from the **Language for non-Unicode programs** drop-down menu.
- 5 To change the language of the Windows menus, windows and online help files provided by Microsoft Windows, select the **Languages** tab of the **Regional and Language Options** window.



Non-Microsoft Windows applications stay in English, even if you change these settings.

- 6 Select your language from the drop-down list.
- 7 Click **Apply** to apply the changes.
You are prompted to log off and log on again. Only then, the changes to the new language will take effect.
- 8 Click **Start**, and select **Log Off**.
- 9 Click **Log Off** in the **Log Off Windows** window. If necessary, enter your password to log on again. All the menus, help files and icons are then displayed in your selected language. However, some parts may remain in English.

To change the keyboard layout

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 In the **Control Panel** window, double-click the **Regional and Language Options** icon.
If you do not see this icon, click **Switch to Classic View** on the left side.
- 3 In the **Languages** tab of the **Regional and Language Options** window, click the **Details** button.
The **Text Services and Input Languages** window appears.
- 4 In the **Settings** tab of the **Text Services and Input Languages** window, select your keyboard from the **Default input language** drop-down menu.
- 5 If your keyboard is not available, click the **Add** button.
The **Add Input Language** window appears.
- 6 Select the input language and keyboard from the drop-down menu.
- 7 Click the **OK** button to close the **Add Input Language** window.
- 8 Click the **OK** button to close the **Regional and Language Options** window.

Configuring Your Modem

Before you can start using your internal modem (not all modems are built-in), or each time you use your modem while traveling, make sure that the country of the active location defined in the **Phone and Modem Options** dialog box matches the country you are dialing from.

You may notice a **Country Selector** tab under your current modem driver options. As the **Country Selector** tab is not a constant feature, do not use this tab to change the country settings. Only the following procedure is reliable.

To change your modem country settings

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Double-click **Phone and Modem Options**.
The **Phone and Modem Options** window appears.
If you do not see the **Phone and Modem Options** window, click **Switch to Classic View** on the left side.
- 3 Select your location on the **Dialing Rules** tab.
- 4 Click the **Edit** button to change the current configuration.
The **Edit Location** window appears.
Or
Click the **New** button to configure your modem.
The **New Location** window appears.
- 5 Check the country/region settings, and make sure it matches the place you are dialing from.



Pulse dial may not be supported in some counties and/or regions.

- 6 If you modified your location settings, click **Apply**, and then **OK**.
The **Phone and Modem Options** window appears.
- 7 Check that your modem is listed in the **Modems** tab.
If your modem is not listed, click **Add** and follow the wizard.
- 8 Click **Apply/OK**. Your modem is configured.



Before applying new country settings, please make sure your phone cable is disconnected from your computer.

Updating the Modem Driver

To update the modem driver

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Printers and Other Hardware**.
- 3 Click **Phone and Modem Options**.
The **Phone and Modem Options** window appears.
- 4 Click the **Modems** tab and then click **Properties** to view the properties of your modem.
The **Modem Properties** window appears.
- 5 On the **Driver** tab, click **Update driver**.
The **Hardware Update Wizard** window appears.
Follow the on-screen instructions. You can perform a Windows search for the driver, or point to the driver's location yourself.

Setting a Sony Wallpaper

Your Sony VAIO computer offers you, among many other features, a choice of wallpapers. You can change the wallpaper, the background of your desktop, as many times as you like. There are several VAIO-specific wallpapers to choose from.

To set another VAIO wallpaper

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Appearance and Themes**.
- 3 Click **Display**.
- 4 Click the **Desktop** tab.
A list of Windows and VAIO wallpapers is displayed.
- 5 Select a wallpaper from the **Background** list.
You can see a preview of this wallpaper in the monitor above the **Background** list.
- 6 Adjust the position of the wallpaper with the **Position** drop-down list.
- 7 Click **Apply** when you have found the appropriate wallpaper.
- 8 Click **OK**.
The wallpaper is applied to your computer.



A higher screen resolution reduces the size of items on your screen and increases the relative space on your desktop.

You may not be able to increase the screen resolution above a certain level. Your monitor and video adapters, for example, determine to which extent you can change the resolution.

To install bundled software from the supplied **Recovery Disc** or your hard disk drive, see the printed **Recovery Guide** for details. For software bundled with accessories, check first the installation procedure that comes with the accessory.

To install other software, use the following procedure.

Before installing the applications:

- Install and connect a hardware device, if necessary (see the **Managing Drivers (page 111)** section);
- Close all open applications.

To install an application

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Add or Remove Programs**.
- 3 Click **Add New Programs**, and then click **CD or Floppy**.
The **Install Program From Floppy Disk or CD-ROM** window appears.
- 4 Insert the first installation floppy disk or CD-ROM and click **Next**.
The **Run Installation Program** appears.
- 5 For the rest of the procedure, follow the on-screen instructions.



When using **Add or Remove Programs**, you can only install programs that were written for Windows operating systems.

Changing or Removing Software

You can remove or change a software application any time you like. Before proceeding, close the application you want to change/remove.

To change or remove software

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Add or Remove Programs**.
- 3 Select the software you want to change or remove.
 - To change a program, click **Change/Remove** or **Change** and follow the on-screen instructions.
 - To uninstall a program, click **Change/Remove** or **Remove**, then click **Next** followed by **OK**.
If the **Locked file detected** window appears, click **Reboot**. The computer restarts once uninstallation is completed and all previously used files are deleted.
If the **Shared file detected** window appears, it is recommended that you click **No** to keep shared files.
Click **Close**.
The software is uninstalled.



When you click **Change or Remove**, some programs may be removed without any further warning. **Make sure you are certain you want to remove it beforehand.**



You can sort programs by selecting different options in **Sort by**.

Add or Remove Programs will only remove programs that were written for Windows operating systems. For other programs, check the documentation to see if other files (such as .ini files) should be removed.

Caution

Windows File Protection

Installing a program might overwrite shared system files such as **dynamic-link libraries** (DLL files)* and executable files (EXE files). When system files are overwritten, system performance becomes unpredictable, programs behave erratically, and the operating system can fail.

Never delete files with the following extensions: SYS, DLL, OCX, TTF, or FON.

In Windows XP, **Windows File Protection** prevents the replacement of protected system files such as SYS, DLL, OCX, TTF, FON, and EXE files. **Windows File Protection** runs in the background and protects all files installed by the **Windows Setup** program.

Windows File Protection detects attempts by other programs to replace or move a protected system file. It also checks the file's digital signature.

* This is an operating system feature that allows executable routines (generally serving a specific function or set of functions) to be stored separately as files with DLL extensions. These routines are loaded only when needed by the program that calls them.

File Signature Verification

When you install a new application on your computer, you might overwrite system files and device driver files with unsigned or incompatible versions, which provokes system instability.

The system files and device driver files provided with Windows XP have a Microsoft digital signature, which indicates that the files are original, unaltered system files or that they have been approved by Microsoft for use with Windows.

Installing a Driver

For more information on (re)installing drivers, see the printed **Recovery Guide** for details.

To install a driver that is stored on the C: drive

- 1 Go to the folder **C:\Drivers**.
- 2 Select the correct folder.
If you need to update a modem driver, for example, select the **Modem** folder.
- 3 If there is an .exe file, double-click the .exe file and follow the online procedure.
If there is no .exe file, you need to go through the **Device Manager** to update the driver (see the second option in the **Updating a Driver (page 116)** chapter).

If the driver comes on a CD-ROM or disc accompanying an accessory and the driver does not come with a specific installation procedure, proceed as follows to install it:

- 1 Insert the installation CD-ROM or disc accompanying the device into the optical disc drive.
- 2 Connect the device that needs a driver, to your computer.
The **Found New Hardware Wizard** window appears.
- 3 Select **Specify a location**, then click **Next**.
- 4 When installing a driver from the provided CD-ROM (or disc) by using a CD-ROM (or disc) drive connected to the computer, select the **Drivers** folder on the optical disc drive.
- 5 When installing a driver after having copied the contents of the provided CD-ROM (or disc) to your hard disk, browse to the appropriate subdirectory containing the driver. The subdirectory should be found in the folder you copied from the CD-ROM (or disc).
- 6 Click **OK** to begin the search procedure.

- 7 Click **Next** to install the driver.
A new window appears when the driver has been installed.
- 8 Click **Finish**.
You may be asked to restart your machine.
- 9 Click **Yes**.
The driver is installed.



To install your device driver, you must log on to your computer as a user with administrator rights.

Checking the Driver's Installation

When the computer restarts, check that the device is working properly.

To check the driver's installation

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Performance and Maintenance**.
- 3 Click **System**.
- 4 Click the **Hardware** tab, then click **Device Manager**.
- 5 Double-click the option corresponding to the device you installed, then double-click your device. The **Properties** dialog box appears.
- 6 Make sure that the **This device is working properly** message is displayed under **Device status**.
- 7 Click **OK**.
Close all the opened windows, your device is ready for use.

The device is not working properly in the following cases:

- Your device is shown in **Device Manager** with a yellow question or exclamation mark.
Right-click your device and click **Uninstall**. Then repeat from step 2 in **Installing a Driver (page 112)**.
- Double-clicking the category of your device in the device manager list does not display your device.
You have to remove your device. See **Uninstalling a Driver (page 117)** to remove it. Then repeat from step 2 in **Installing a Driver (page 112)**.
- Double-clicking **Other devices** displays your device.
You have to right-click your device, then click **Uninstall**. Repeat from step 2 in **Installing a Driver (page 112)**.

- ❑ If the **This device is working properly** message is not displayed, the device is not working properly. Click **OK** to close the **Properties** window, then reinstall the driver. To reinstall the driver, right-click **Uninstall** and click **OK** when the **Confirm Device Removal** window appears. When a message window asking you to confirm restart, click **Yes** and wait until your computer restarts. Then, repeat from step 2 in **Installing a Driver (page 112)**.
- ❑ If your device is not displayed in the **Properties** window, the device is not working properly. Repeat steps 1 through 4 in the previous sections to check the driver's installation. Click your device, then click **Uninstall** to remove the driver. Click **Yes** to restart the computer. When the computer restarts, repeat from step 2 in **Uninstalling a Driver (page 117)**.

Updating a Driver

To update the driver

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Printers and Other Hardware**.
- 3 Click the device you want to revert.
- 4 On the **Hardware** tab, click **Properties**.
- 5 On the **Driver** tab, click **Update Driver**.
- 6 Follow the on-screen instructions. You can have Windows search for the driver, or point to the driver's location yourself.

Or:

Uninstalling a Driver

Leave the device connected to your computer while uninstalling the driver.

The **Uninstall** button is unavailable if removing the driver would make your device unusable.

To uninstall your device driver, you must be logged on to your computer with administrator rights.

Restoring a Driver

System Restore is a feature of Microsoft Windows XP that restores your computer to a previous state, if a problem occurs, without losing your personal data files.

System Restore monitors changes to the system, and it automatically creates easily identified restore points. These restore points allow you to revert the system to a previous time. They are created daily and at the time of significant system events (such as when an application or driver is installed).

To revert to your previous driver

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
- 2 Click **Printers and Other Hardware**.
- 3 Click the device you want to revert.
- 4 On the **Hardware** tab, click **Properties**.
- 5 Click the **Driver** tab.
- 6 On the **Driver** tab, click **Roll Back Driver**.

Or:

- 1 Click **Start** and then **My Computer**.
- 2 Click **View system information** on the left of the window.
- 3 Click the **Hardware** tab, then click **Device Manager**.
- 4 Double-click the option corresponding to the device you installed, then double-click your device. The **Properties** window appears.
- 5 Click the **Driver** tab.
- 6 On the **Driver** tab, click **Roll Back Driver**.
You have your previous driver back.



You must be logged on to your computer with administrator rights in order to complete this procedure.

Restoring your computer does not affect or change your personal data files.

Upgrading Your VAIO Computer

Your computer and memory modules use high precision components and electronic connectors technology. To avoid the invalidation of your guarantee due to mishandling, we recommend that:

- You contact your dealer to install a new memory module.
- You do not install it yourself, if you are not familiar with upgrading memory on a computer.
- You do not touch the connectors or open the memory panel.

For the type of module and amount of memory installed on your computer, refer to the printed **Specifications** sheet.

Contact VAIO-Link if you need assistance.

Adding and Removing Memory

If you want to expand the functionality of your computer, you can increase the memory by installing optional memory modules. Before you upgrade your computer's memory, read the notes and procedures in the following pages. The number of available slots depends on the configuration of your computer.

Notes on adding/removing memory modules

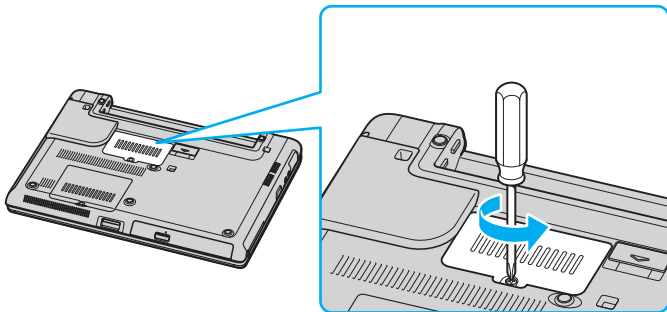
- ❑ Be careful when changing memory. Improper installation of memory modules may cause damage to your system. This damage may void your manufacturers warranty.
- ❑ Only use memory modules that are compatible with your computer. If a memory module is not detected by your computer or Windows becomes unstable, contact your sales dealer or the manufacturer of your memory module.
- ❑ Electrostatic discharge can damage electronic components. Before touching a memory module, ensure the following:
 - ❑ The procedures described in this document assume familiarity with the general terminology associated with personal computers and with the safety practices and regulatory compliance required for using and modifying electronic equipment.
 - ❑ Turn off the computer and disconnect the system from its power source (that is, battery or AC adapter) and from any telecommunication links, networks, or modems before you open the computer. Failure to do so may result in personal injury or equipment damage.
 - ❑ Electrostatic Discharge (ESD) can damage memory modules and other components. Install the memory module only at an ESD workstation. If such a station is not available, do not work in a carpeted area, and do not handle materials that produce or hold static electricity (cellophane wrappers, for example). Ground yourself by maintaining contact with an unpainted metal portion of the chassis while performing the procedure.
 - ❑ Do not open the memory module package until you are ready to change the module. The package protects the module from ESD.
- ❑ Use the special bag delivered with the memory module or wrap the module in aluminium foil to protect it from electrostatic discharge.

- Introducing any liquids or any foreign substances or objects into the memory slots, or other internal components of the computer, will result in damage to the computer and any repair costs will not be covered by the warranty.
- Do not place the memory module in places subject to
 - Heat sources such as radiators or air ducts
 - Direct sunlight
 - Excessive dust
 - Mechanical vibration or shock
 - Strong magnets or speakers that are not magnetically shielded
 - Ambient temperature of more than 35°C or less than 5°C
 - High humidity
- Handle the memory module with care. To avoid injuries to your hands and fingers, do not touch the edges of the components and circuit boards inside your computer.

Removing and Installing a Memory Module

To change or add a memory module to the memory module slot on the bottom of the computer

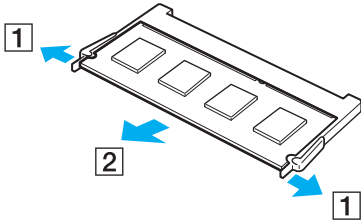
- 1 Shut down your computer and disconnect all peripheral devices.
- 2 Unplug the computer and remove the battery.
- 3 Wait until the computer cools down.
- 4 Unscrew the screw at the bottom of the computer.



- 5 Touch a metal object (such as the connector panel on the back of the computer) to discharge static electricity.

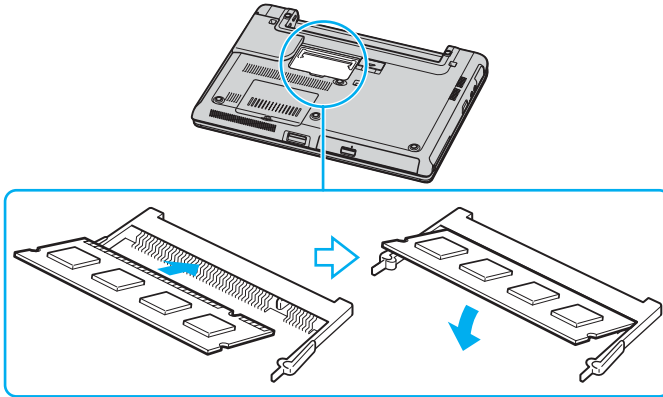
6 Remove the memory module:

- Pull the tabs in the direction of the arrows (1).
The memory module is released.



- Make sure that the memory module tilts up and then pull it out in the direction of the arrow (2).

- 7 Slide the memory module into the memory module slot and push it in until it clicks into place.



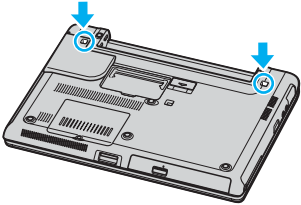

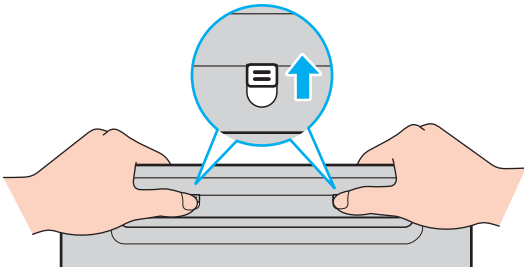
- 8 Close the module cover and then tighten the screws on the bottom of the computer.

To change or add a memory module to the memory module underneath the keyboard

- 1 Shut down your computer and disconnect all peripheral devices.
- 2 Unplug the computer and remove the battery pack.
- 3 Wait until the computer cools down.
- 4 Unscrew the two screws at the bottom of the computer.

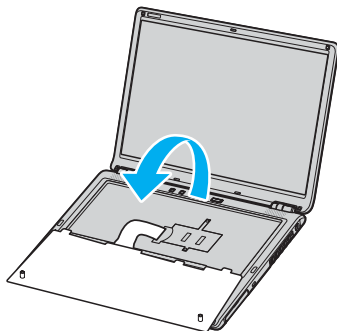


- 5 Slide up the latches in the battery compartment to unlock the keyboard.



- 6 Turn over the computer upside down and lift open the LCD.

- 7 Lift the keyboard from the LCD display side, turn it over the touchpad, and gently put it on the computer. Be careful not to detach the cable when lifting the keyboard.

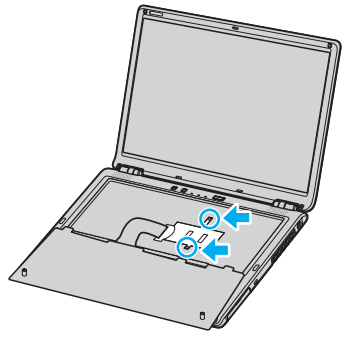


! Observe the following when turning over the keyboard:

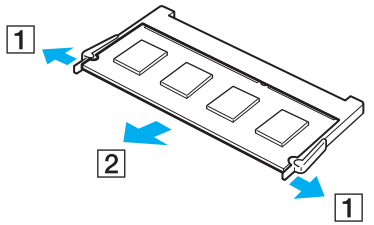
8 Unscrew the two screws next to the memory slot and remove the memory slot cover.

The memory module is released.

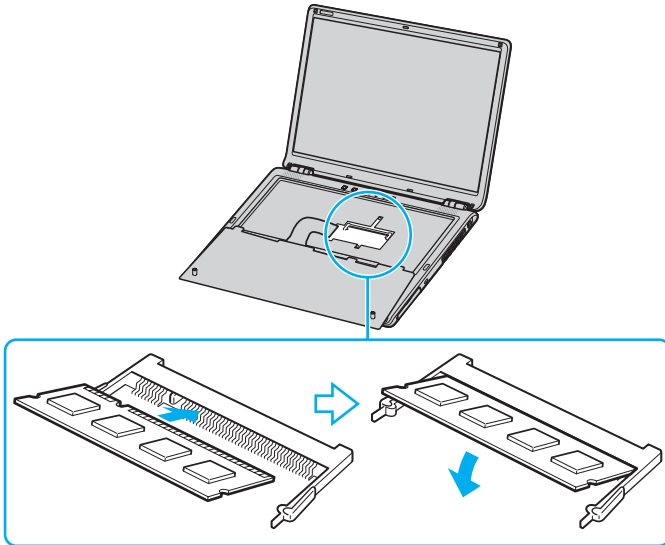


- Make sure that the memory module tilts up and then pull it out in the direction of the arrow (2).

- ❑ Slide the memory module into the slot.



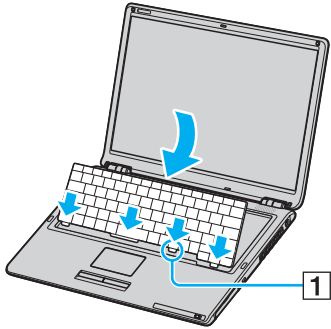
- ❑ Push in the memory module until it clicks into place.

14 Gently replace the keyboard and then press it into the computer.



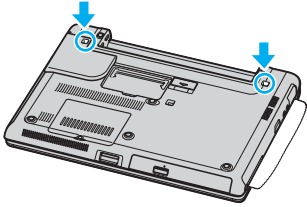
It would be easier to replace the keyboard if you gently hold down the area indicated by (1).

- Do not apply excessive force to the keyboard, as it may deform the keyboard.
- Do not pull the keyboard cable with excessive force, as it may result in the broken cable.

- 15 Close the LCD and then tighten the screws on the bottom of the computer.



! Make sure to put a soft cloth between the LCD and the keyboard to prevent damage to the LCD.

- 16 Reinstall the battery pack and turn on the computer.

Viewing the Amount of Memory

To view the amount of memory

- 1 Turn on the computer.
- 2 Click **Start**, point to **All Programs**, and click **VAIO Control Center**.
- 3 Double-click the **System Information** folder in the **VAIO Control Center** window.
- 4 Double-click the **System Information** icon in the **System Information** folder.
You can view the amount of system memory. If the additional memory does not appear, repeat the whole procedure and restart the computer.

On Handling the LCD Screen

- ❑ Do not leave the LCD facing the sun. This could damage the LCD. Be careful when using the computer near a window.
- ❑ Do not scratch the LCD or exert pressure on it. This could cause a malfunction.
- ❑ Using the computer in low temperature conditions may produce a residual image on the screen. This is not a malfunction. When the computer returns to normal temperature, the screen returns to normal.
- ❑ A residual image may appear on the screen if the same image is displayed for a lengthy period of time. The residual image disappears in a while. You can use a screen saver to prevent residual images.
- ❑ The screen becomes warm during operation. This is normal and does not indicate a malfunction.
- ❑ The LCD is manufactured using high-precision technology. You may, however, see tiny black points and/or bright points (red, blue, or green) that continuously appear on the LCD. This is a normal result of the manufacturing process and does not indicate a malfunction.
- ❑ Avoid rubbing the LCD screen. This could damage the screen. Use a soft, dry cloth to wipe the LCD screen.

On Using the Power Source

- See the printed **Specifications** sheet to check the power operation of your computer.
- Do not share the AC outlet with other power-consuming equipment, such as a photocopier or shredder.
- You can purchase a power strip with a surge protector. This device prevents damage to your computer caused by sudden power surges, in an electrical storm, for example.
- Do not place heavy objects on the power cord.
- To disconnect the cord, pull it out by the plug. Never pull the cord itself.
- Unplug your computer from the AC outlet if you are planning to not use the computer for a long time.
- Make sure that the AC outlet is easily accessible.
- When the AC adapter is not used, unplug it from the AC outlet.
- Use the AC adapter that comes with your computer or genuine Sony products. Do not use any other AC adapter as it may cause a malfunction.

On Handling Your Computer

- ❑ Clean the cabinet with a soft cloth, which is dry or lightly moistened with a mild detergent solution. Do not use any type of abrasive pad, scouring powder, or solvent such as alcohol or benzine, as these may damage the finish of your computer.
- ❑ If you drop a solid object or any liquid onto the computer, shut down your computer and then unplug it. You may want to have the computer checked by qualified personnel before operating it again.
- ❑ Do not drop the computer or place heavy objects on top of the computer.
- ❑ Do not place your computer in a location subject to:
 - ❑ Heat sources, such as radiators or air ducts
 - ❑ Direct sunlight
 - ❑ Excessive dust
 - ❑ Moisture or rain
 - ❑ Mechanical vibration or shock
 - ❑ Strong magnets or speakers that are not magnetically shielded
 - ❑ Ambient temperature of more than 35°C or less than 5°C
 - ❑ High humidity
- ❑ Do not place electronic equipment near your computer. The electromagnetic field of your computer may cause a malfunction.
- ❑ Provide adequate air circulation to prevent internal heat from building up. Do not place your computer on porous surfaces such as rugs or blankets, or near material such as curtains or draperies that may block its ventilation slots.
- ❑ The computer uses high-frequency radio signals and may cause interference to radio or TV reception. If this occurs, relocate the computer a suitable distance away from the set.
- ❑ Use only specified peripheral equipment and interface cables; otherwise, problems may occur.
- ❑ Do not use cut or damaged connection cables.

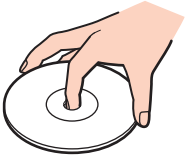
- ❑ If the computer is brought directly from a cold location to a warm one, moisture may condense inside your computer. In this case, allow at least one hour before turning on your computer. If any problems occur, unplug your computer and contact VAIO-Link.
- ❑ Make sure you disconnect the power cord before cleaning the computer.
- ❑ To avoid losing data if your computer is damaged, back up your data regularly.

On Handling Floppy Disks

- Do not open the shutter manually or touch the surface of the floppy disk.
- Keep floppy disks away from magnets.
- Keep floppy disks away from direct sunlight and other sources of heat.
- Keep the floppy disk away from any liquid. Do not let the floppy disk get wet. When you are not using the floppy disk, always remove it from the floppy disk drive and use a storage case.
- If the floppy disk comes with a label, make sure that the label is properly attached. If the edge of the label is curled up, the label may stick to the inside of the floppy disk drive and cause a malfunction or damage your floppy disk.

On Handling Discs

- ❑ Do not touch the surface of the disc.
- ❑ Do not drop or bend the disc.
- ❑ Fingerprints and dust on the surface of a disc may cause read errors. Always hold the disc by its edges and central hole, as shown below:



- ❑ Proper care of the disc is essential to its continuous reliability. Do not use solvents (such as benzene, thinner, alcohol, commercially available cleaners, or anti-static spray) which may cause damage to the disc.
- ❑ For normal cleaning, hold the disc by its edge and use a soft cloth to wipe the surface from the center out.
- ❑ If the disc is badly soiled, moisten a soft cloth with water, wring it out well, and use it to wipe the surface of the disc from the center out. Wipe off any remaining moisture with a dry soft cloth.
- ❑ Never put stickers on discs. This will affect the use of the disc irreparably.

On Using the Battery Pack

- ❑ Do not leave the battery pack in temperatures above 60°C, such as in a car parked in the sun or under direct sunlight.
- ❑ Battery life is shorter in a cold environment. This is due to decreased battery efficiency at low temperatures.
- ❑ Charge the batteries at temperatures between 10°C to 30°C. Lower temperatures require a longer charging time.
- ❑ While the battery is in use or being charged, the battery pack heats up. This is normal and is not cause for concern.
- ❑ Keep the battery pack away from all sources of heat.
- ❑ Keep the battery pack dry.
- ❑ Do not open or try to disassemble the battery pack.
- ❑ Do not expose the battery pack to any mechanical shock.
- ❑ If you are not using the computer for an extended period of time, remove the battery pack from the computer to prevent damage to the battery.
- ❑ If, after fully charging the battery pack, the battery power is still low, the battery pack may be reaching the end of its life and should be replaced.
- ❑ You do not need to discharge the battery before recharging.
- ❑ If you have not used the battery pack for a considerable amount of time, recharge the battery.

On Using Headphones

- ❑ **Road safety** – Do not use headphones while driving, cycling, or operating any motorized vehicle. It may create a traffic hazard and is illegal in some areas. It can also be potentially dangerous to play loud music while walking, especially at pedestrian crossings.
- ❑ **Preventing hearing damage** – Avoid using headphones at high volume. Hearing experts advise against continuous, loud and extended play. If you experience a ringing in your ears, reduce the volume or discontinue use.

On Handling Memory Stick Media

- ❑ Do not use the media in locations that are subject to static electricity or electrical noise.
- ❑ Do not touch the Memory Stick media connector with your finger or metallic objects.
- ❑ Use only the label supplied with the Memory Stick media as a label.
- ❑ Do not bend, drop, or apply strong shock to the Memory Stick media.
- ❑ Do not disassemble or modify Memory Stick media.
- ❑ Do not let Memory Stick media get wet.
- ❑ Do not use or store Memory Stick media in a location subject to:
 - ❑ Extremely high temperatures, such as in a car parked in the sun
 - ❑ Direct sunlight
 - ❑ High humidity or
 - ❑ Corrosive substances
- ❑ Use the storage case supplied with the Memory Stick media.

On Handling the Hard Disk

The hard disk has a high storage density and reads or writes data in a short time. However, it can be easily damaged by mechanical vibration, shock or dust.

Although the hard disk has the internal safety device to prevent losing data due to mechanical vibration, shock or dust, you should be careful when handling your computer.

To avoid damaging your hard disk

- Do not subject your computer to sudden movements.
- Keep the computer away from magnets.
- Do not place your computer in a location subject to mechanical vibration or in an unstable position.
- Do not move your computer while the power is on.
- Do not turn off the power or restart the computer while reading or writing data to disk.
- Do not use your computer in a place subject to extreme changes in temperature.



If the hard disk is damaged, the data cannot be restored.

Troubleshooting the optical disc drive

My optical disc drive tray does not open

- Make sure the computer is turned on and press the disc eject button.
- Click **Start** and then **My Computer**. Right-click the optical disc drive and select **Eject**.
- Make sure the computer is not in **Standby** or **Hibernate** mode.
- If this does not work, try the following:
 - Turn off the computer and insert a sharp, pointed object (for example a paperclip) into the manual eject hole* on the optical disc drive to slide out the tray.

* The location of the eject button and hole depends on the model of your computer. See the printed **Specifications** sheet for details on your model.

I cannot play a disc

- After inserting the disc, wait for a few seconds for the system to detect it before you try to access it.
- Make sure the label of the disc is facing up.
- If the disc requires software, make sure the software is installed according to the instructions of the program.
- Check the volume of your speakers.
- Clean the disc with an appropriate cleaner.
- Make sure your computer is running on AC power supply only and try the disc again.
- There may be condensation in the drive. Remove the disc and leave the drive open for approximately one hour. Remove the battery while you wait for the condensation to disappear.

I cannot play a DVD

- ❑ If a region code warning appears when you are using your DVD player, it could be that the DVD you are trying to play is incompatible with the optical disc drive on your computer. The region code is listed on the packaging of the disc.
- ❑ Change the resolution under **Control Panel - Display** to a lower resolution.
- ❑ If you see video but cannot hear sound, check all of the following:
 - ❑ Make sure the mute setting is off on your DVD player.
 - ❑ Check the **Master Volume** settings of the **Sounds and Audio Device Properties**.
 - ❑ If you have connected speakers externally, check the volume settings of your computer speakers and check the connections between your speakers and the computer.
 - ❑ In the **Device Manager**, check that the correct drivers are installed properly. To display the **Device Manager**, click **Start**, **Control Panel**, and **Performance and Maintenance**. Click the **System** icon and then the **Device Manager** button on the **Hardware** tab.
- ❑ A dirty or damaged disc may cause the computer to "hang" while it tries to read the disc. If necessary, reboot the computer, remove the disc and then check that it is not dirty or damaged.
- ❑ Check your PG settings (Parental Guidance) in the DVD software as they might be preventing you from playing certain DVDs when they are activated.



On your computer, the default DVD region code is 2. Do not change this setting using the **Region Code Change** function in Windows, or using any other software applications. System malfunctions originating from the user changing the DVD region code are beyond the scope of your warranty and will result in service charges for repair.

If you do not immediately see the **Display** icon after clicking **Control Panel**, click **Switch to Classic View** on the left.

I cannot play a DVD when using two screens

- You will not have a problem in the following situations:
 - When you use a CRT or an LCD display on its own.
 - When you play MPEG files which are recorded on the hard disk drive with **Windows Media Player 10** or **VAIO Zone**.

The reading speed of CD/DVD-RWs is very slow

Generally, the reading speed of a CD/DVD-RW is slower than that of a -ROM or -R. The reading speed can also vary depending on the type of format.

The disc tray does not eject even when the eject button is pressed

- Check that the computer is turned on.
- The CD-writing application software may be stopping the disc from being ejected.
- Make sure the computer is not in **Standby** or **Hibernate** mode.

The disc tray ejects even when it has been locked into place

- Ensure that the disc is placed with the label side facing up.
- Clean the disc and the optical disc drive lens with an appropriate cleaner.
- The disc may be scratched. Place another disc to see if that is the reason.
- There may be condensation in the drive. Remove the disc and leave the drive open for approximately one hour. Remove the battery while you wait for the condensation to disappear.

Troubleshooting PC Cards

My PC Card is not working

Make sure the PC Card is compatible with your version of Windows.

Troubleshooting the modem

My modem does not work or cannot establish a connection

- Check that the phone line is plugged into your computer.
- Make sure that the modem is the only device connected to your phone line.
- Check that the phone line is working. You can check the line by plugging in an ordinary phone and listening for a dial tone.
- Check that the phone number the program is dialling is correct. The modem dialling mode may be incompatible with your telephone line.
- The modem may not work properly if you are with a Private Automatic Branch eXchange (PABX).
- In the **Phone and Modem Options** dialog box (**Control Panel / Printers and Other Hardware / Phone and Modem Options**), check that your modem is listed on the **Modems** tab, and that the location information is correct on the **Dialing Rules** tab.
If you do not see the **Phone and Modem Options** icon, click **Switch to Classic View** on the left side.
- We recommend you use country-specific phone plug to plug the phone line into the wall jack, because use of any other phone plug can decrease the connection quality.
- Your computer cannot be connected to a coin-operated telephone, and may not work with multiple phone lines or a private branch exchange (PBX). If you connect the modem to a parallel connected phone line, the modem or the other connected device may not function properly. Some of these connections may result in excess electrical current and could cause a malfunction in the internal modem.

- ❑ Only DTMF (Dual Tone Multi Frequency) signalling (tone dialling) is supported.
- ❑ The internal modem is intended to be used for data and fax communications using DTMF (Dual Tone Multi Frequency) signalling (tone dialing) on the PSTN (Public Switched Telephone Network) networks in the following countries: Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Finland, France, Greece, Germany, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, Norway, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom.
- ❑ If your computer is equipped with the flexible modem connector cover, do not pull it too forcefully.

My modem connection is slow

Many factors influence modem connection speed, including telephone line noise or compatibility with telephone equipment (such as fax machines or other modems). If you think your modem is not connecting properly to other PC-based modems, fax machines, or your Internet Service Provider, check the following:

- ❑ Have your phone company check that your phone line is free from any line noise.
- ❑ If your problem is fax-related, check that there are no problems with the fax machine you are calling and that it is compatible with fax modems.
- ❑ If you are having a problem connecting with your Internet Service Provider, check that the ISP is not experiencing technical problems.
- ❑ If you have a second phone line available, try connecting the modem to that line.

Troubleshooting the Bluetooth functionality

I cannot use the Bluetooth functionality

- If the Bluetooth indicator is off, turn on the **WIRELESS** switch.
- You cannot use the Bluetooth functionality when the computer is in a power saving mode. Return to normal mode, then turn on the **WIRELESS** switch.

The connected device does not appear in the Bluetooth Device List

If the connected device is also connected to other devices, it may not appear on the **Devices** tab in the **Bluetooth Device** window or you may not be able to communicate with the device.

I cannot find the Bluetooth device with which I want to communicate

- Check that the Bluetooth functionality of the device with which you want to communicate is on. See the other device's manual for more details.
- If the device with which you want to communicate is already communicating with another Bluetooth device, it may not be found or it may not be able to communicate with your computer.
- To allow other Bluetooth devices to communicate with your computer, go to the **Options** tab in the **Bluetooth Device** window and select the check box **Allow Bluetooth devices to connect to this computer**.
For more information on the Bluetooth Device window, see **Communicating with Another Bluetooth Device** ([page 55](#)).

The data transfer speed is slow

The data transfer speed depends on the obstacles and/or the distance between the two devices, but also on the radio wave quality, the operating system or the software used. Try to move your computer or try to place the two devices closer.

I cannot communicate with the other device although the distance between both devices is within 10 metres

- ❑ The data transfer distance can be shorter than 10 meters depending on existing obstacles between the two devices, on radio wave quality, on the operating system or the software used. Try to move your computer or to place both devices closer.
- ❑ If the device with which you want to communicate is already communicating with another Bluetooth device, it may not be found or it may not be able to communicate with your computer.
- ❑ Check that the Bluetooth functionality of the device with which you want to communicate is on. See the other device's manual for more details.

File transmission and reception fail.

When transmitting a file with the **Bluetooth File Forwarding Wizard**, the receiving device must be set beforehand to receive incoming transmissions.

To set a device to receive incoming transmissions

- 1 Start the computer and turn on the Bluetooth device.
- 2 Click **Start**, point to **All programs**, **Accessories**, and **Communications**, then click **Bluetooth File Forwarding Wizard**.
- 3 Click **Next**, select the check box next to **Receive files**, and click **Next** again.

The message The Bluetooth device requires authentication appears on the taskbar.

The target Bluetooth enabled device is requesting connection authentication. Mutual authentication is required to enable Bluetooth communications with this device.

Cannot connect to service supported by target Bluetooth device.

Connection is only possible for services also supported by the computer equipped with the Bluetooth functionality. For more details, refer to the **Bluetooth Device** Help in Windows XP and/or the operating instructions or electronic manual for the targeted Bluetooth device.

Unable to exchange business card data with a cellular phone.

The business card exchange function is not supported.

Troubleshooting Wireless LAN

I cannot use the Wireless LAN functionality

Check if the **WIRELESS** (on models with the Bluetooth functionality^{*}) or **WIRELESS LAN** (on models without the Bluetooth functionality) switch is turned on and the WIRELESS LAN indicator is lit.

* See the printed **Specifications** sheet to see whether your model is equipped with the Bluetooth functionality.

The Wireless LAN Access Point and your computer cannot communicate

- Check if the **WIRELESS** (on models with the Bluetooth functionality^{*}) or **WIRELESS LAN** (on models without the Bluetooth functionality) switch is turned on and the WIRELESS LAN indicator is lit.
- Check if the power of the Access Point is turned on.
- Check if the Access Point is displayed in the **Available networks** window.
 - To check this, click Start and then **Control Panel**.
 - Click **Network and Internet Connections**.
 - Click the **Network Connections** icon.
 - Right-click the **Wireless Network Connection** icon and select **Properties**.
 - Select the **Wireless Networks** tab.
 - Check if the Access Point is displayed in **Available networks**.
 - Connection availability is affected by distance and obstructions. You may need to move your computer away from obstructions or neared to any Access Point you may be using.

* See the printed **Specifications** sheet to see whether your model is equipped with the Bluetooth functionality.

The data transfer speed is slow

- ❑ The maximum communication speed can vary depending on the obstacles or the distance between the communication devices, the radio waves, the operating system or the software you use. Remove the obstacle or make the distance between the Access Point and your machine smaller.
- ❑ It is possible that your Access Point communicates at the same time with another Access Point. Read the manual of the Access Point.
- ❑ If several computers communicate with the same Access Point, the concentration may be too high. Wait a few minutes and try to access again.
- ❑ If a Wireless LAN device using the IEEE802.11g standard communicates with a device using the IEEE802.11b standard, then it is normal that the speed reduces. Devices using the IEEE802.11g standard are 5 times faster than the ones using the IEEE802.11b standard.

I cannot access the Internet

- ❑ Check the settings of the Access Point. See the manual of the Access Point.
- ❑ Check if your computer and the Access Point are communicating.
- ❑ Make the distance between the Access Point and your machine smaller.

I cannot use a Wireless LAN network

Check if the **Wireless Zero Configuration** service is active.

To check the status of the Wireless Zero Configuration service

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
The **Control Panel** window appears.
- 2 Click the **Performance and Maintenance** icon.
- 3 Click the **Administrative Tools** icon.
- 4 Double-click the **Services** icon.
The **Services** window appears.
- 5 Check **Status** and **Startup Type** for **Wireless Zero Configuration**.
When **Started** and **Automatic** are shown under **Status** and **Startup Type**, respectively, the **Wireless Zero Configuration** service is active.

To activate the Wireless Zero Configuration service

- 1 On the **Services** window, right-click **Wireless Zero Configuration** and click **Properties**.
The **Wireless Zero Configuration Properties** window appears.
- 2 Select **Automatic** for **Startup type** and click **Apply**.
- 3 Click **Start** under **Service status**.
- 4 Click **OK** to close the window.

Troubleshooting Power Management

The power management setting is not responding

Your computer's operating system may become unstable if a lower power state, such as **Hibernate** is initiated, and then changed before the computer completely enters the lower power state.

To restore the computer to its normal operating stability

- 1 Close all open applications.
- 2 Press the **Ctrl+Alt+Delete** keys simultaneously and select **Restart** from the shut down menu drop-down list.
The computer restarts.
- 3 If the procedure does not work, press and hold the power button for four seconds or longer to shut down the computer.

Troubleshooting External Displays

I cannot use the Plug and Display function

Depending on the external display or the way it is connected, the Plug and Display function may not be available. Use the **Fn+F7** keys to select the output destination.

I cannot display contents on two or more displays at the same time

You cannot display contents on multiple external displays at the same time. Select one of the external displays.

Troubleshooting Sound (Speaker)

My speakers are not producing sound

- The built-in speakers may be turned off. Press the **Fn+F2** keys or the **S1** button (default assignment) to turn on the speakers.
- The speaker volume may be turned to the minimum. Press the **Fn+F4** keys and then the **↑** or **→** key, or keep pressing the **Fn+F4** keys to increase the volume.
- If you use external speakers, check that the speakers are properly connected and the volume is turned up. If the speakers have a mute button, make sure it is off. If batteries power the speakers, check that the batteries are inserted properly and that they are charged.
- If you have connected an audio cable to the headphones jack, disconnect the cable.
- If your computer is powered by battery, check that the battery pack is properly installed and charged.
- If you are using an application that has its own volume control, check that the volume is turned up.
- Check the volume controls in Windows.

Troubleshooting Sound (Microphone)

My microphone does not work

If you are using an external microphone, check that the microphone is plugged into the microphone jack correctly.

My microphone volume is too high or too low

Proceed as follows to adjust the volume.

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
The **Control Panel** window appears.
- 2 Click **Sounds, Speech, and Audio Devices** and then **Sounds and Audio Devices**.
- 3 Click **Volume** under **Sound recording** on the **Audio** tab.
- 4 See if the **Select** check box for **Microphone Balance** is selected. If not, click the check box.
- 5 Move the slider up or down to adjust the volume.
- 6 If the volume is still too high or too low, select **Advanced Controls** from the **Options** menu.
The **Advanced** button appears for **Microphone Balance**.
- 7 Click the **Advanced** button and select/deselect **Microphone Boost** or **+20db Gain** under **Other Controls** to adjust the volume.

Only left-channel audio is recorded with a monaural microphone

Proceed as follows to change the audio channel setting.

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
The **Control Panel** window appears.
- 2 Click **Sounds, Speech, and Audio Devices** and then **Sounds and Audio Devices**.
- 3 Click **Volume** under **Sound recording** on the **Audio** tab.
- 4 Select **Advanced Controls** from the **Options** menu.
The **Advanced** button appears for **Microphone Balance**.
- 5 Click the **Advanced** button and select the **Mono Mic** check box under **Other Controls**.



This audio channel setting is only applied to sound recording with a microphone.

Stereo sound is not recorded with a stereo microphone

Proceed as follows to change the audio channel setting.

- 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
The **Control Panel** window appears.
- 2 Click **Sounds, Speech, and Audio Devices** and then **Sounds and Audio Devices**.
- 3 Click **Volume** under **Sound recording** on the **Audio** tab.
- 4 Select **Advanced Controls** from the **Options** menu.
The **Advanced** button appears for **Microphone Balance**.
- 5 Click the **Advanced** button and deselect the **Mono Mic** check box under **Other Controls**.

Troubleshooting Floppy Disks

My USB floppy disk drive cannot write to a floppy disk


- The floppy disk is write-protected. Disable the write-protect feature or use a floppy disk that is not write-protected.
- Check that the disk is properly inserted into the floppy disk drive.
- Your disk may be corrupt. Try to insert another floppy disk.

The optional USB floppy disk drive is not recognized as drive A

To set the floppy disk drive to A

- 1 Turn the system power on.
- 2 Connect the floppy disk drive.
- 3 Select **Control Panel** from the **Start** menu.
- 4 Click **Performance and Maintenance**.
- 5 Click **System**.
- 6 Select the **Hardware** tab, then click **Device Manager**.
- 7 Select **Universal Serial Bus controllers**, then **Y-E Data USB Floppy**.
- 8 From the Action menu, click **Uninstall**.
- 9 Keep clicking **OK** until the **Confirmation of deletion of device** message appears.
- 10 Select **Scan for hardware changes** from the **Action** menu.
The floppy disk drive is recognized as drive A.

Troubleshooting Printers

- ❑ Make sure that the printer driver supports Windows XP.
Ask the manufacturer of your printer for the driver that supports Windows XP.
- ❑ The printer port  on the port replicator is internally connected to the USB. If your printer is connected to the printer port on the port replicator, proceed as follows to check the printer port settings.
 - 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
 - 2 Click the **Printers and Other Hardware** icon.
 - 3 Click the **Printers and Faxes** icon.
 - 4 Right-click the printer to select **Properties**.
 - 5 Click the **Ports** tab.
 - 6 Check if the check box for **USB001** is selected. If another check box is selected, click the box for **USB001**.
 - 7 Click **OK**.

If the above procedure does not work, right-click the printer and selected "Delete" on the window in step 3 above to delete the printer. Then, install the printer driver once again.

- ❑ If the bidirectional communication functions are provided with your printer, disabling the functions on your computer may enable printing. Proceed as follows:
 - 1 Click **Start** and then **Control Panel**.
 - 2 Click the **Printers and Other Hardware** icon.
 - 3 Click the **Printers and Faxes** icon.
 - 4 Right-click the printer to select **Properties**.
 - 5 Click the **Ports** tab.
 - 6 Click the check box for **Enable bidirectional support** to deselect it.
 - 7 Click **OK**.



This change to the settings will disable the bidirectional communication functions of your printer, such as data transfer, status monitoring, and remote panel.

- ❑ Check the physical connections between your computer and printer, the AC adapter and the power cord, and the power cord and an AC outlet, and then restart your computer.

Troubleshooting i.LINK Devices

I cannot establish an i.LINK connection between two VAIO computers

- You must have administrator rights on your computer to be able to link the two.
- Disconnect then reconnect the i.LINK cable.
- If you still have no connection after waiting for a while, restart both computers.
- If either computer has just returned from a power saving mode, the connection may be affected. In this case, make sure you perform a full restart before connecting them.

When I record images to a digital video device using DVgate Plus, I see an error message

- Close all open applications and restart your computer. Frequent recording of images to a digital video device while using **DVgate Plus** sometimes causes this error.
- Your DV device will need to have DV In/Out in order to be able to transfer your files to the DV device.

I cannot use digital devices

- Check that the DV device is turned on and that the cables are properly connected.
- If you are using multiple i.LINK devices, the combination of the connected devices may cause unstable operation. If this is the case, turn off all connected devices and disconnect unused devices. Check the connection and then turn on the power again.
- You are strongly advised to use only Sony i.LINK cables, as using other brands may cause problems with the i.LINK devices.
